

Revolutionary Camera Turns Out Finished Photo In One Minute's Time

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP)—A revolutionary new camera, which turns out a finished picture one minute after the shutter is snapped, accomplishing in a single step all the processing operations of ordinary photography, was demonstrated yesterday.

The camera, which can be carried by anyone, was announced to the Optical Society of America by its inventor, Edwin H. Land, of Boston, the discoverer of polaroid.

Several types have been built, Land said, and announcement will be made in a few months about when the cameras will be available and what they will cost.

The inventor, demonstrating a portrait type and also one of the size frequently carried by news photographers, said the process could be adapted to any camera and possibly to making motion pictures.

The camera produces a fully-finished picture, of the same quality as developed and printed in the pub-

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Mother, Children Burned To Death

NEVADA, Mo., Feb. 22 (AP)—A mother and her five children, ranging from eight months to nine years of age, burned to death today when they were trapped in one room of their home following a heating stove explosion.

The victims of the fire were: Mrs. Betty Graham, wife of a Missouri-Kansas-Texas railroad employee; Ollie Lee, 9; Wayne, 7; Freda, 4; Marjorie, 2; and Mary Sue, eight months old.

Charles Graham, the husband and father, was in a critical condition. He suffered body burns over his entire body in attempting to reach his wife and children.

He told firemen that the explosion followed his attempt to start a fire in the living room heating stove by using kerosene.

Chemical Mixture Cause Of Blast

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 22 (AP)—Chemical experts agreed today that a 300-gallon mixture of chemicals equivalent to 3600 pounds of explosive virtually as violent as nitroglycerin caused the downtown Los Angeles explosion which killed 15 and injured 158 Thursday.

A mixture of perchloric acid and acetic anhydride was the lethal potion which disintegrated the O'Connor electro-plating plant, wrecked nearly a block of buildings and rattled a square mile of the city, said Police Chemist Ray Pinker.

Capt. Carl Halter of the fire department arson squad and G. L. Cheney, analytical chemist. Workmen still searched today for two others still missing.

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Parents Jailed In Child Death

PORT ORCHARD, Wash., Feb. 22 (AP)—Coroner Al Segerquist today ordered the young parents jailed for investigation after an autopsy last night on the body of their 16-month-old son.

He said the autopsy surgeon's report showed suffocation and collapse of the lungs as the cause of the death yesterday of the infant, James M. Wells, and that the body bore bruises and burns and a laceration behind the right ear and that there were signs of malnutrition.

The parents, Homer E. Wells, 26, and Ruth Helen Wells, 23, of Orchard Heights, also have a two-year-old daughter. Wells is a former naval shipyard rigger's helper.

Dime Store Queen To Wed

ST. MORITZ, Switzerland, Feb. 22 (AP)—Barbara Hutton, once a princess, was reported all set today to marry another prince as her fourth husband.

Her secretary said yesterday that the American dime-store heiress and Prince Igor Nikolaievitch Troubetzkoy, now wintering here, would leave next week for Paris and expected to be married there soon. Both are 34.

Miss Hutton is the granddaughter of F. W. Woolworth, founder of a five-and-10-store chain. She inherited an estimated \$25,000,000 from her mother in 1917.

She has been married to—and divorced from—Georgian Prince Alexis Mdivani, Danish Count Kurt Haugwitz-Reventlow and Movie Actor Cary Grant. Her divorce from Grant became final last August. She had a son, Lance, by Reventlow. The son will be 11 next Tuesday.

Troubetzkoy was described as a French citizen and descendant of Lithuanian royalty.

Pressed for information about himself, the prince said "I don't receive journalists."

Reds Boggle On Lend-Lease

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—State department officials today viewed as a "polite gesture," assured they said Russia has given orally in Moscow that it is considering U. S. insistence on a settlement of the Soviet's lend-lease account.

The assurances, officials said privately, have been given Ambassador Walter Bedell Smith in the Soviet capital.

Press Officer Roger Tubby told reporters, however, that "the Russians have not indicated at any time that they plan to negotiate with this government concerning a settlement."

Consequently the Russian move, department officials said, is regarded here as a polite gesture and not even a commitment to reply to the series of American requests that Russia settle up its \$11,000,000,000 wartime bill.

Ellsworth Favors Slash

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) said today that house Republicans voted for the six billion dollar reduction in President Truman's budget because they placed "the welfare of their country above their personal desires."

"One of the main reasons why the people took control of congress away from the new deal party was that they felt the new dealers were spending too much money," Ellsworth said in a statement.

Ellsworth said that when the cut first was proposed he felt it might impair the effectiveness of the armed forces.

"After going over the figures, after talking with our experts and reading testimony given in hearings," he said, "I reached the conclusion the proposed budget reduction will not hurt either our world position or our national defense. We will still have a two-ocean navy, we will have a million men under arms in the army and a substantial air force."

Truman Puts Wreath On Grave

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—President Truman led the nation today in ceremonies honoring the memory of George Washington.

The chief executive motored to Mt. Vernon to lay a wreath on Washington's tomb, commemorating the 215th anniversary of the birth of the first president.

The presidential yacht Williamsburg, gleaming in a new coat of white paint in contrast to the battleship gray so familiar during war days, preceded the president to Mt. Vernon and was ready to take him and members of the White House staff aboard for a week-end cruise on the Potomac.

Also undetermined in today's test was the invention's ability to work smoothly in interrupting current caused by the effect of parallel lines on each other—known technically as line charging current—a continuing problem with present equipment, Schultz said.

Using a blast of compressed air instead of the conventional oil bath to extinguish the arc formed when contact points are separated, the German circuit breaker should permit lower construction and maintenance costs if successful, he added.

Electrical engineers from major American power and equipment manufacturing companies and from the hydro-electric commissions of Ontario and British Columbia are here for the tests which will continue to Monday morning.

Land Drawing To Be Held

The second big give-away of public lands by the government is getting under way at Yakima, Wash., according to Ten Broeck Williamson, who was in charge of the Tululake homestead drawings here in December.

Williamson said that many of the veterans entered into the Tululake drawing are expected to enter the Roza drawing, as the project in Washington will be known. A total of 1722.3 acres of land will be given to 28 lucky winners, Williamson said. The individual farm units will range from 37 to 81 acres, and are scattered along the Sunnyside irrigation canal from Buena to Acton, Wash.

Williamson stressed that applicants for the drawing should file new applications with the office of the superintendent, Yakima reclamation project, bureau of reclamation, Yakima, Wash. The applications must be filed before April 1, 1947, he added. He also pointed out that the applications filed for the Tululake drawing are not applicable for the Roza drawing. Williamson pointed out that many of the qualifications for the Roza farms are different than the requirements for the Tululake drawing. Specifically, he mentioned that whereas only \$2000 was necessary in the Tululake qualifications, \$3000 will be required for the Roza project.

They will have quarters with the ninth infantry regiment and will be given mental and physical aptitude tests.

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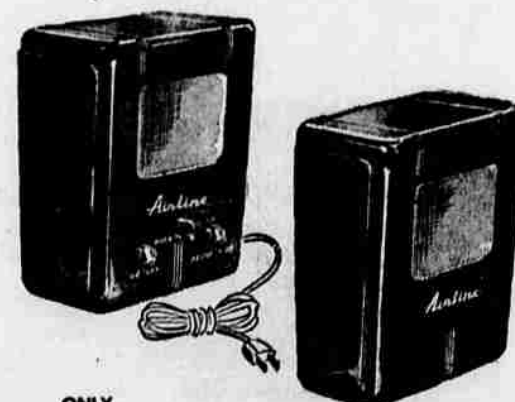


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
