Pacific Fleet Masses For First Post War Maneuvers

PEARL HARBOR, Feb. 22 (AP)—The powerful United States Pacific fleet—declared by its chief to be again fully operative—began taking positions today for its first full-dress post-war maneuvers.

Adm. John H. Towers, commander of the Pacific fleet, said in an interview yesterday his forces had recovered from the jolts of swift demobilization and were ready for next week's battle games.

While the fleet is not yet at peak efficiency, Towers declared that with "operations such as these" it would not take long "to bring the fleet back to battle efficiency."

As the admiral spoke, his warships already were on the move across thousands of miles of the Pacific. Task force 38, built around the carriers Princeton and Tarawa, were assembling at Kwajalein.

"Lucky" Luciano Leaves Italy For Cuba, U. S. Cuts Off Narcotic Trade

HAVANA, Feb. 22 (AP)—Charles "Lucky" Luciano, former vice overlord in New York, was reported today to have been taken to secret police headquarters for questioning.

An investigation had been ordered after the United States cut off narcotics shipments to Cuba on the ground that Luciano's presence here might lead to diversion of the drugs.

Interior Minister Alfredo Riqueno told Secret Police Chief Benito Herrera yesterday to determine how Luciano, who was deported from the U. S. to Italy, had entered Cuba and how he was occupying himself.

Secret police said that they knew Luciano was in Cuba and that he had been seen frequently at the race track in Havana, though it had not been learned where he was staying.

The ban on further supplies of narcotics to Cuba was issued in Washington by Harry J. Anslinger, federal narcotics commissioner. Julian Solorzano, secretary of the Cuban presidency, sought to discount the possibility that Luciano's presence could lead to diversion of imported drugs. He pointed out that the government recently decreed that all shipments of narcotics to Cuba be brought in through the port of Havana.

Authorities here stated that if Luciano was found to have entered Cuba illegally, he would be deported at once, presumably to Italy.

Luciano, former top man of

New York vice rackets, was sent to prison in 1936 for 30 to 50 years. Last year he received a pardon from Gov. Thomas E. Dewey—who as district attorney had prosecuted Luciano—and was sent back to his native Italy. Recently, however, reports reached Washington that Luciano had found a haven in Cuba.

Anslinger, announcing the ban on narcotics exports to Cuba, said the Cuban government had been advised that the ban would be continued as long as Luciano remained there.

Man Jailed On Drunk Charge

Muriel Davis, 47, resident of the Anchor hotel whom police said insisted that he couldn't be jailed because he had "pull in this town," is in the city lockup today. The charge is drunk and disorderly.

Davis was arrested at Louis Pollin's early last night when an employe of the store called police after allegedly seeing him pocket three pairs of cheap gloves. Davis, according to police, protested the arrest on grounds that he had "pull."

The man was also booked for investigation of petty larceny.
