Mickey Henry was presented with a corsage, in appreciation of her work as chairman of the rummage sale held last Saturday. She reported an income of \$236.21, as well as having helped some 200 in need of clothing.

Gertrude Moore announced the sale of seals for the Crippled Children's fund. The sale would open on March 6. There will be a sale on March 29. Esther Johnson was appointed general manager of sales, with Lillian Hills and Ida Odell as helpers. Izola Parker will head a committee to line up girls, assisted by Alice Howard and Kathleen Thompson. Speaker at the meeting was Gertrude Koke, social service worker at the Oregon State hospital. Miss Koke is a graduate of the University of Oregon, and has been with the hospital for three years. She worked on a Eugene newspaper staff for eight years prior to taking her present position.

Miss Koke said that the national mental health act of last July will aid materially in a vast educational program now under way. As well as education of trained psychiatrists, the public must be trained to realize that the mentally ill need early and satisfactory care just as does one with scarlet fever or heart trouble. She reported that although alcoholics had not been a major problem, the number sent to them since the first of January of this year had increased alarmingly, particularly among women patients.
