Siamese Police Battle Bandits

BANGKOK, Siam, Feb. 24 (AP)—Five hundred Siamese police, trying to wipe out guerrillas who have been terrorizing the countryside, were reported battling today against a band of 300 entrenched in a village in the hills of San Kaphi, north of Ratburi.

A telegram from the area said 29 bandits and three police were killed yesterday.

The guerrillas, led by Sau ("Tiger") Phai and Sua Saing, are armed with heavy and light machine-guns and grenades. They have been accused of kidnapping a Catholic priest and several other persons.

Police Chief Phra Phicharn, in Bangkok, said his men would wipe out the band in 10 days.

city police to get an ambulance for Thompson.

The ripped wires put out all telephone lines in the suburban district, and the 66,000-volt line disrupted power service to Lakeview.

Joe Steele and other persons who were at the airport when Rankin took off said that it was obvious from the ground that something was wrong and the plane wouldn't gain altitude. Steele said it disappeared from sight at the airport, moving northward in a slow curve.

Fatal Injuries

The bodies of Rankin and Elie were taken to Ward's Funeral home, and that of Wallan to Whitlock's. Rankin's injuries included a broken neck, skull fracture, completely crushed chest, abdominal injuries and fractures of both legs. Elie had a fractured skull and both legs were broken. Wallan's chest was crushed and his arms broken.

Rankin's wife, in Tulare, Calif., was notified of the tragedy by telephone last night, and was said to be holding up well. She will not come to Klamath Falls but Rankin's partner, Bob Norstrom, is flying in from Vancouver, Wash., to make funeral arrangements. The body will be shipped to Tulare.

The famed flier, since he quit his spectacular stunt career in 1945, has operated Rankin Aviation Industries, with Norstrom as his partner, and was distributor of Republic planes in the northwest.

Auto Dealers Die Cy Wallan, 39, had the Kaiser-Frazer auto dealership here. He resided at 721 Mitchell, and is survived by his wife, Margie, and two daughters, Barbara Lee, 10, and Susan, 8. He and Jack Elie jointly operated the Wallan Flying Service, distributing Republic and other type planes.

Elie, 42, was the Nash dealer in Klamath Falls. He resided with his wife, Matilda, and young daughter, Jacqueline, at 2027 Apollagate. Funeral arrangements include recitation of the Holy Rosary Tuesday at 8:30 p. m. at Ward's chapel and services at Sacred Heart church, Wednesday at 9 a. m.

"Bus" Thompson is 32 years old and lived at the home in housing unit at the airport. He was a veteran pilot and flight

officer during the war, flying the "Hump" route from India to China with the army transport command. He had some 3300 hours in the air.

Badly Damaged The plane, CAA registry NC 6096K, was badly damaged in the crash, the front of the cabin and instrument panel pushed right into the laps of the two men in front, Rankin and Elie. Both wings were damaged and the engine cowl torn.

Rankin, whose given name is John Gilbert, flew the plane up from Tulare, Calif., Saturday afternoon, and he was registered at the Willard hotel.

The plane was the type in which the occupants sat out in front of the wings and engine.
