

Army And Navy To Get Funds This Year, But Will Take Cut Next Year

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (P)—Senator Taft (R-Ohio) put the army and navy on notice today that while they may escape severe budget cuts this year, next congress session very likely will trim their combined funds to \$7,500,000,000.

As the senate marked time before resuming limited debate tomorrow on a government spending ceiling goal, Taft told a reporter he believes the armed services ought to begin now to plan to taper off costs to a peacetime level.

Taft, who heads the senate republican policy committee, said he regards \$7,500,000,000 as the

5 Countries To Benefit By Relief

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (P)—Undersecretary of State Will Clayton indicated strongly today that the \$350,000,000 administration asks for relief will be expended in only five European countries and China.

Testifying before the house foreign affairs committee, he said that these European countries "appear to have need of outside assistance—Austria, Greece, Hungary, Italy and Poland."

Significant by their omission were both Yugoslavia and White Russia, which have been large recipients of UNRRA relief.

UNRRA's operations in Europe will begin winding up March 31, and President Truman has asked that congress vote \$350,000,000 for direct relief from the United States.

Clayton estimated for the committee that \$350,000,000 will provide 57 per cent of the "minimum" relief requirements of the six countries. The United States furnished 72 per cent of UNRRA finances.

He asserted that to stop the flow of relief when UNRRA folds "would be disastrous."

"If we fail to provide the relief now when it is needed," he said, "much of the humanitarian work heretofore done by our government and others will be undermined, much suffering and economic deterioration will undoubtedly occur, with political and economic consequences to the rest of the world, ourselves included, not pleasant to contemplate."

Oregon received \$559,280, California \$414,466, and \$398,089 went to Washington.

The states in turn will distribute most of the funds to the counties.
