yield per acre here is much higher than the national average. The capacity of cleaning plants is adequate to handle a considerable increase. It was recommended that along with the expansion of Alaska production, producers maintain the high standard of the crop, keeping it free of weeds and insects.

The land use committee urged development of all lands having potential agricultural value. Some of the areas suggested for early development are Hanks marsh near Algoma, the bird refuge on Upper Klamath lake, southwest of Fort Klamath; projects on the Klamath Indian reservation and the land in Oregon adjacent to Lower Klamath lake.

The committee urged that every effort be made to enlarge the program of education on weed control and all phases of conservation, development and improvement.

Meat Suggested

A meeting at the beginning of each harvest season to set a farm labor wage scale was suggested by the farm labor committee to avoid the situation which has developed in the past when there was a variance in wages paid to farm help.

Youth Programs

Parent participation in youth programs was urged in the youth activities report. The limiting factor on enlarging youth organizations is the lack of adult leaders, and the committee recommended that more recognition be given to the leaders as well as encouraging older youth members or former members of groups to undertake leadership.

News Behind The News

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27—The republicans are skating on thin ice in their budget slashing, and know it. But they can safely make it, and the goal justifies the risk.

As a matter of fact, the ice is thinner than the arguing senators know or indicate in their public statements. From a top finance authority on a recent trip, I learned what few of the best informed Washingtonians realize—namely, nearly \$100 billions of the federal debt is in short term paper.

Press Cool

THE press seemed to have an inkling of something like this situation. A survey of newspaper opinion the second week in February before the issue became hot, showed a surprising total of only 7 per cent of the newspapers behind the proposed house cut of \$6 billions.

What the press and public does not apparently understand is that the \$6 billions figure is only a little above 17 per cent of the budget. Anyone who knows Washington must realize that a substantial amount can prudently be cut from any budget without damage to necessary government activity.

Today's Roundup

YESTERDAY'S favorable vote on the Marine Barracks vocational school by the state board of education came directly as a result of a strong recommendation from the state's vocational education department, declaring the need for the program and the suitability of the Barracks plant for the purpose.

As the project goes before the legislature, a factor of significance in its behalf is that it has come this far without political pressure. It has been proceeding on its merits, as seen by the state educational authorities and by the U. S. office of education, which made a study before WAA agreed to turn the big plant over for \$1 for educational purposes.

It is well for friends of the project to recognize that it has not yet passed the final hurdle. The board of education voted to ask for an appropriation of \$620,000 to set up the school and operate it for a biennium. A factor in its favor from the appropriation standpoint is that this large initial appropriation will not be needed again in future years.

War Aftermath

ONE of the scandalous aftermaths of the war is the deteriorated condition of mechanical and other equipment left scattered around the country as the armed services have moved out of military installations. Most of this property has fallen to the War Assets administration for disposal, and WAA officials, if they were in a position to do it, could no doubt give some descriptive information of the junk that has come to them that would be both startling and disgusting.

It is apparent that the military services, once through with anything, didn't worry much about conserving its value. Ordinary protective measures were generally omitted. The result of this all, of course, is that the government is taking heavy losses on this property that could have been substantially reduced if the military people hadn't been so hell bent to get somewhere else quick, and had assigned efficient maintenance crews to protect this property pending disposal.

An added factor in the deplorable condition of much of this equipment is that it took so long to get around to making it available for other uses. Vast quantities of supplies and equipment were permitted to lie around during a period of acute shortage, deteriorating in condition and decreasing in demand and market value.

The capital, of course, would be you know what.
