

# Crookedest Railroad In The World Wants To Quit

RAPID CITY, S. D., Feb. 27 (AP)—The self-styled "crookedest railroad in the world" with enough curves in its 35-mile length to complete 14 circles, wants to get out of business.

Boyd Leedom, Rapid City attorney, said the Rapid City, Black Hills and Western has asked the interstate commerce commission for permission to abandon its line from here along Rapid canyon to Mystic, S. D., because need for its operation no longer exists and it is too expensive to maintain. It has been operated by a group of local business men since World War I.

Climbing 1790 feet in 20 of its 35 miles, the railroad crosses 105 bridges and once survived a flash flood which carried away 100 of

them. The road had its birth in 1890 as the Dakota and Wyoming railroad, a few miles of track serving several mines, but the firm collapsed and the line was taken over by C. D. Crouch, construction engineer, who raised enough funds to push it to a junction with the Burlington road at Mystic.

President P. W. Loomis said abandonment will not be damaging to the road's current customers because most of the right-of-way will revert to the U. S. forest service.

# Group Asks Trout Probe

CULVER, Feb. 27 (AP)—The Central Oregon chamber of commerce, charging that the state game commission hasn't put enough trout in the state's streams, asked Governor Snell today for an investigation.

The chamber asked the governor to appoint an interim legislative committee to study the commission's work, obtain data about methods used in other western states to propagate trout, and report back by next January.

Duncan L. McKay, Bend, spokesman for central Oregon groups, declared that this region was losing "thousands of dollars a day" in tourist trade because the Deschutes, Crooked, and Metolius rivers were too fished out.

He charged that Oregon had distributed only 7,000,000 trout fry last year, while Washington distributed 49,000,000. As a result of insufficient stocking, he declared, Oregon advertising groups did not mention this area's famed fishing streams in tourist ads.

# US Veterans Hold Margin

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—Chairman Bridges (R-N.H.), of the senate appropriations committee said today the 13,000,000 World War II veterans and their immediate families probably outnumber the rest of the population.

"I think it would be a healthy thing for the country to know the facts about this," Bridges told a newsmen.

The question came up during a discussion in the committee yesterday of a request by the veterans administration for a \$30,000,000 supplementary appropriation to cover operations for the next two months. VA already has received \$135,000,000 for administrative expenses during the current fiscal year.

"We have 18,000,000 veterans today," Gen. Omar Bradley, the veterans administrator, told the committee, "and before long we will have another 2,000,000 eligible to veterans legislation."
