

Magazine To Feature Plans For New City, County Jail

A story on the plans for the Klamath Falls-Klamath county jail building, which were prepared by Architect Sheldon Brumbaugh, will appear in the June issue of Progressive Architecture, a leading architectural journal published in New York.

Feature Editor George A. Sanderson has written to Brumbaugh asking permission to use a story on the Klamath building in the June issue, prior to a later story on Brumbaugh's work here and the opportunities a smaller city offers architects.

"In our search for buildings that rise above mere good planning or sound construction to become distinguished architecture from every point of view, no building type is more difficult to track down than the one that includes custodial or jail facilities," said Sanderson. He went on to state that the Klamath building represents painstaking research which has produced an outstandingly good plan. He added: "The relation of several elements are organized with a view to simple and efficient operation, and the finished design is a building of distinction of which any community can be proud."

He commended Brumbaugh on the excellence and completeness of the drawings.

Brumbaugh completed the plans for the city-county jail building late last summer, and they were approved by members of the city-county jail commission. The architect took a trip through California studying jail buildings, and consulted leading authorities, before preparing the plans. In his work, he conferred at length with Sheriff Lloyd Low and Police Chief Orville Hamilton, as well as members of the board.

Limit Bill Gets Priority

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27 (AP)—The senate republican leadership gave top priority today to a proposal that future presidents be limited to nine years in office by constitutional amendment.

Chairman Wiley (R-Wis.) of the judiciary committee declared the bill "embodies the unwritten construction of American policy observed prior to the time of President Roosevelt."

The measure, which bears a 9 to 1 endorsement of the committee, may come up for debate tomorrow if the senate disposes of the budget issue by mid-afternoon.

"It should be considered aside from the personality of the late president," Wiley told a reporter. "It is for the future rather than the past and personalities should not enter into it."

Arsenic Poisoning Victims Recover

Police Sgt. Roy Warner said the body of Mrs. Fondrick, 62, was found in the kitchen with a bullet hole in the head. Fondrick's body was discovered at the bottom of the cellar stairs with a rifle nearby.

Warner reported a son-in-law, Lee W. Perry, who found the bodies, said the couple had been advised by a judge to reconsider their divorce plans.

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Mother Held In Child Death

ONTARIO, Ore., Feb. 27 (AP)—County Judge Irwin Troxell yesterday ordered 29-year-old Mrs. William Jones held for a sanity hearing in connection with the death of her 2-year-old daughter.

Sheriff Charles W. Glenn said the death of Norma Jones, daughter of the tenant farmer couple, was first reported to have been caused by a fall. An autopsy revealed a fractured skull and body bruises, he said.

The parents were quoted by the sheriff as saying that two other children were fatally injured in falls, a daughter tum-

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bling from her stroller in June, 1943, and a son falling against a lamp in December, 1944. The family moved here from Sparks, Nev., a year ago. There are two other children, daughters aged 10 and 8.
