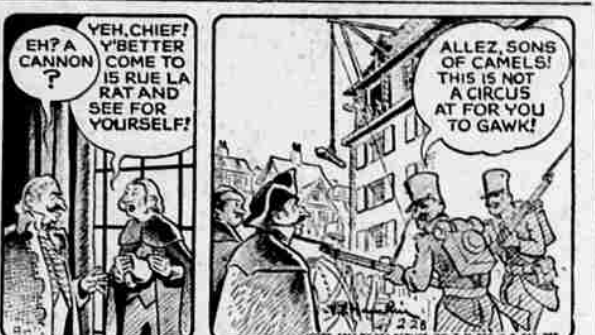
eral Klamath county schools prior to this morning's assembly.
