

Truman, GOP Legislative Cooperation Wears Thin At End Of Second Month

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 (AP)—Cooperation between President Truman and the republican-controlled congress appears to be wearing thin on domestic issues today as the legislators near the end of their second month's work.

Mr. Truman and GOP leaders have maintained outward harmony on foreign policies, but there are signs that a blowup may not be far off on home affairs.

Although he called republicans as well as democrats to the White House yesterday for a highly secret discussion by Secretary of State George C. Marshall on European affairs, not since February 3 has Mr. Truman held any meeting with congressional leaders to talk over the legislative program.

At that session, only the second of its kind since the president said he intended to cooperate with congress for the welfare of the nation, the lawmakers said there had been a "desultory but congenial" conference on the state of the union. Everything of a controversial nature was avoided at the first meeting on January 16, those who attended reported.

Mr. Truman is leaving Washington Sunday for Mexico and later a Caribbean cruise and may be away when congressional committees have completed drafting labor disputes bills. Most legislators think these bills will offer the first big test on cooperation.

Chairman Taft (Ohio) of the senate labor committee, already has said he wants to meet with the president when a bill is ready to determine whether Mr. Truman has any specific objections.

If the president and top GOP congress members reach any general agreement, it would be hailed as a demonstration that the two branches can work together despite their control by opposite parties.

The feeling in congress, however, is that the possibility of any such agreement is slim because democratic party leaders generally are regarded as courting the organized labor vote for the 1948 presidential campaign. Union leaders have opposed virtually all of the major suggestions thus far made for changes in the laws.

On another important front—government spending—neither the president nor congress has offered any kind of cooperation Mr. Truman said he was talking about before congress met.

In New England the weather was fair and cold with Augusta, Me., reporting a low of 15 degrees. Buffalo, N. Y., had a low of 19. It was clear and cold in the midwest with Chicago reporting a low of 10 degrees. There was a prediction of snow in Chicago.

Sub zero temperatures were reported in northern Minnesota and Montana where a cold wave is moving in from Canada.

Weather In East Abates

Snow blanketed much of the southwest today, but warm rains moving east from Texas were expected to wash away traces by nightfall.

The light snow covered most of Tennessee, northern Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina, extending almost as far south as Montgomery, Ala., and Macon, Ga.

The snow storm was moving east-northeast. Rain was falling in the area south of the snow storm.

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Senate To Hear Labor

SALEM, Feb. 28 (AP)—The senate labor and industries committee will hear labor's objections next Monday to three bills to ban secondary boycott, let courts issue injunctions in labor disputes, and provide for secret elections among employees to determine if labor disputes exist.

On the same day, the house labor and industries committee will hear what labor think about proposed constitutional amendments to ban the closed shop and to force labor unions to incorporate.

Employers told the senate committee late yesterday that the three bills before it would be a long step toward labor peace.

Senator Eugene E. Marsh, Minnville, sponsor of the bills, said his bills would be of special benefit to small employers.

Army Assistant Coach Resigns

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Feb. 28 (AP)—Stuart K. Holcomb, assistant coach of the army team at West Point for the last three years, has signed a five-year contract as head football coach at Purdue university. Guy (Red) Mackey, Purdue athletic director, made the announcement today.

CIO Leaders Stand Behind Carson

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28 (AP)—Ranking CIO leaders here stood fast today on endorsement of Joseph K. Carson, ex-mayor of Portland, as a member of the U. S. maritime commission.

A congressional hearing on Carson's appointment was postponed to allow the national CIO officials to ask union heads here on Carson's attitude in the 1936 longshore strikes.

Transfer Of Army Planes Speeded

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 28 (AP)—Portland army air base will complete its transfer of planes and personnel to McChord field by March 20.

Maj. Carl V. Ernst said orders call for the transfer to take place by tomorrow, but that the change could not be effected in that time. Most of the 81 men and 25 officers here will remain on detached duty until the transfer is completed, he said.

Grade A Milk Market Eyed

PORTLAND, Feb. 28 (AP)—For the first time in four years dairy-men are trying to get into the grade A milk market in Portland.

W. W. Henry, manager of the dairy co-operative, reported this yesterday, explaining that the price of factory milk has dropped to a point low enough that producers are attempting to get into the bottle and can trade.

Meanwhile the city's consumption of milk in 1946 was reported down 11.9 per cent from the previous year. Dr. Thomas L. Meador, city health officer, added, however, that Portland still consumes in one form or another, 52 per cent more milk than in pre-war days.

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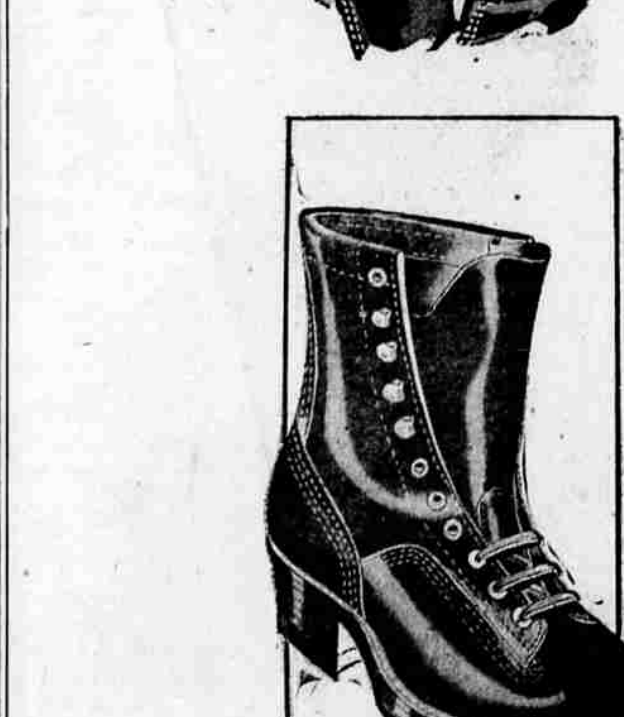
