

# Pelicans Beat Cavemen, 56-42

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 28.—Klamath's Pelicans clung to their district 4 basketball lead and took another step toward entry in the state hoop playoff tourney by defeating the Grants Pass Cavemen 56 to 42 in a rough, brawling game here last night. It was the 12th conference win for the Pels against one loss.

The two teams meet here again tonight to finish off the series and the season's competition between the two high schools.

Last night the lead in the game zig-zagged all through the initial quarter. Dave Knox hit a foul shot for Grants Pass to start the ball rolling, but Joe Zarosinski sank two buckets to put the Pels in the lead. Jack Orr added a pair of foul shots and a basket to swing the lead back to the Cavemen.

The game went on that way until Zarosinski sank a free throw just as the period ended to make the count 15-15.

Gene Hoover scored on an under-the-basket pass and lay-in to open the second quarter, and that shot accounted to the victory. Grants Pass was often close but never took the lead after that. Halftime score was 26-22.

The game got rougher as the evening wore on and several times rabid Grants Pass fans were on the verge of swarming out onto the floor over one official's decision or another.

Hoover fouled out early in the third period. Jack Orr followed him and in the fourth canto Bob Edwards of the Cavemen was waved off the floor. When Orr, captain and main plug of the Grants Pass team fouled out the crowd demonstrated so riotously that a technical foul was called on the Cavemen.

Joe Zarosinski scored 17 points for the Pels to lead the pack in that department. Lefty Coleman had 12. For the Cavemen Alvy Boyce sank 13 points and Orr had 11 up until the time he fouled out.

It was a rugged game all the way through. No less than 47 fouls were called—24 on Grants Pass, 23 on Klamath.

In a preliminary contest the Klamath Jayvees beat their Grants Pass counterparts 54 to 22.

# Red Rocha Must Get Nine More

Long-legged Eph Rocha of Oregon State, who appeared in position last week to saunter leisurely into the throne room of northern division scoring, must break into a brisk canter Saturday night to overtake Jack Nichols of Washington and retain the division tally title he won a year ago.

It was another giant Jack—Jack Phoenix of Idaho—who put the clamps on Rocha when he was in a fair way to scoop up the honors without half trying. After Phoenix held him to three points as Idaho trounced Oregon Friday in the season's biggest upset, Rocha couldn't approach his 15-points-per-tilt average in the three remaining games of Oregon State's Palouse country junket.

In the four tilts he tallied just 32 points—six less than he made in a single game against Idaho earlier in the year.

Nichols, with the Washington schedule completed, rests atop the standings with 204 points—highest ever scored in division play by a Washington man—and Rocha must get nine in the Oregon game to wind up the year in the lead.

Rocha leads Nichols in points scored over the entire season, with 323 in 28 games, compared to 303 for Nichols in 24 games. The division leaders:

# Probe Asked Of Oregon's Game Agency

SALEM, Feb. 28 (AP)—Noting that Oregon's fish and wildlife resources are at the lowest point in history and need immediate improvement, Rep. William Niskanen, Bend, introduced a resolution in the house today to have an interim committee appointed to investigate the state game commission.

The investigation would include improvement of its organization, management, personnel, and methods of propagation.

The committee would consist of five members—one senator, two representatives, one appointed by the Isaac Walton League, and one named by the Oregon wildlife federation.

The resolution asks that a study be made of whether license fees should be increased in order to expand the fish and wildlife resources.

The game commission would pay \$5000 to the committee for expenses.
