Article Concerns AAUW President

Of interest to members of Klamath Falls branch of the American Association of University Women is the story which appeared in the February 22 issue of the Newsletter, Oregon division of AAUW, concerning the local president, Mrs. Aaron T. Hoffman.

Two of the talented members of the Oregon division of AAUW who have been so highly esteemed by their fellows as to be chosen branch president are also writers who have won considerable recognition. They are Mrs. Hoffman, now serving as president of the Klamath Falls branch, and Miss Victoria Case, ex-president of the McMinnville branch.

"Talented in music, poetry and dramatics and effective as a leader and organizer, Mrs. Hoffman has contributed richly to the community life of her section. She is awaiting time just now to collect and prepare for publication in book form a number of her original poems, most of which she wrote while her two sons were in service."

"Mrs. Hoffman wrote in blank verse the narrative for the pageant presented in Klamath Falls in the summer of 1946 commemorating the 100th anniversary of the opening of the southern emigrant route to Oregon. This presentation, entitled "Wagon Road to Sky Road," was received with much acclaim. Mrs. Hoffman's part was published in a souvenir booklet that was distributed throughout the state."

"Dr. L. L. Epley, Mrs. Hoffman's father, was at one time president of Philomath college, from which Mrs. Hoffman was graduated in 1917. She later took post-graduate work at the University of Oregon. Her mother, Mina H. Epley, is also an author and has been a teacher."

"Now head of the foreign language department of Klamath Union high school, Mrs. Hoffman started her career as a country school teacher. She taught for two years before her marriage and continued to teach even after the birth of her first child, taking the baby with her as she rode back and forth to school on horseback."

"In 1935, Mrs. Hoffman and her family, which by then included a daughter and two sons, moved to San Diego, California, where Mrs. Hoffman was active in radio and music circles. She returned to Oregon in 1931, and later resumed her teaching."

"At Klamath Union high school one of Mrs. Hoffman's special interests is the Latin club, one of the most active clubs in the school. Mrs. Hoffman and her husband, who is associated with the forest service, live near Klamath Falls on a ranch where they raise saddle horses."

Two of Mrs. Hoffman's poems, "Petals in the Path" and "Futility," appeared in the issue.
