

Eight Klamath Taxpayers Get Federal Tax Refunds

Shaw Lumber company of Klamath Falls got the largest Klamath tax refund made by the federal government in the year ended June 30, 1946. It was for overpayment of excess profit taxes. Seven other Klamath taxpayers were on the list of taxpayers receiving refunds of \$3000 or more announced today by the federal government.

Gas Fumes Kill Two Men

HILLSBORO, March 3 (AP)—The source of gaseous fumes which caused the death of two men at the bottom of a 20-foot well they were digging near here was sought today.

Deputy Coroner James Dierck reported Otto J. Ehm, 41, Metzger, and Donald V. Turner, 44, Hillsboro, had reached rock and had blasted the well bottom late Saturday. Ehm entered the shaft two hours later and was overcome. Turner then attempted to rescue Ehm, but collapsed just after calling to his wife for help.

Dierck said both men were dead when removed from the shaft.

Timber Goes On Pay-As-You-Cut

PORTLAND, March 3 (AP)—Timber sales by the Oregon and California land administration have been put on a pay-as-you-cut program. Forester W. H. Hornung reported today.

Hornung said buyers of O. & C. timber would be required to make a double initial payment, one applying as the final payment and one on the first cutting. A third payment would permit cutting the second timber block, and so on until the full bid price was paid. He said contracts of \$5000 to \$25,000 would require installments of \$5000 and contracts of \$100,000 or more, \$25,000.

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Certified Seed To Be Bought

Barley growers of the Klamath basin plan on securing foundation seed or seed of good quality of Hannechen barley to be grown this year under certification rules and regulations. It has been found that malting barley from this area has not been maintained at a high quality level with considerable mixture of non-malting variety in practically all seed stock. Malting companies and the Oregon State college have been attempting to locate sources of good foundation seed, and now have some that they believe will be eligible for certification this year.

Information on this program can be secured from the Tulelake Growers association at Tulelake or the county agent's office at Klamath Falls. Effort is being made to secure enough orders to secure a car or two of this seed in the Klamath basin this year. Growers interested in securing some of this barley should contact either of the above offices at the earliest possible date.

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Unlicensed Dogs To Be Picked Up By Pound Master

Starting with the new month, all unlicensed dogs in Klamath county will be "dead dogs," H. C. Howard, county poundmaster warned dog owners today.

February 29 was the deadline, Howard stated, for purchase of 1947 dog licenses. Owners have had two months' leeway for purchasing tags and attaching them to their pets' collars. The fact that licenses may have been purchased, he said, is not enough. The tags must be on the animals.

Complaints have been received, the poundmaster said further, against stray dogs in the county and pressure has been brought to bear, resulting in his contemplated drastic action.

Howard said, according to law, he has the right to shoot any unlicensed dog he finds on the street and he intends to pick up strays and put them to death without delay. So if an unlicensed pet disappears suddenly, the owner can rightly conclude

Solons Tackle Highway Bill

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 3 (AP)—Ending a 25-day recess, members of the California legislature returned to their desks today to renew debate on a long-range highway improvement program and methods of financing it.

Governor Earl Warren discussed the need for the road project in a radio talk last night. He stressed that he has not demanded his own plan or proposed a definite means of paying the costs. The decision, he said, rests with the legislature.
