News Notes and Comment

Problems of labor and management were discussed before the Klamath Falls Rotary club at the Willard hotel Friday noon by four University of Oregon speech students under the direction of Lyle Siverson, speech instructor at the university.

Management problems caused by labor, according to Jim Gilbertson, are: too many strikes, violence in the picket lines, too high union initiation fees, and the restraint of production.

Bill Boyer, taking the side of labor, said the actual causes of strikes have been: management's slowness in considering grievances, irritations from repetitious production line work, the pitting of one worker against another through bonuses, and the continual sense of economic insecurity.

Allen Nordwick, who served as chairman for the group, said the best solution for the strike problem in basic industries can be found in railroad industry, where there has been only nine strikes in the past 11 years.

Following this pattern he suggested a four-step procedure for collective bargaining. Problems should go first to individual adjustment boards. If not solved there, the next step should be government mediation, then voluntary arbitration, and finally an emergency board to be appointed by the president to operate with a 30-day "cooling off" period.

Boyd Peterson, seeking a solution for labor-management problems in smaller local industries, stated the need for retaining closed shops if accompanied by "open" unions, unions that are not restrictive. Freedom to speak to labor should be returned to management, he said.

Jurisdictional strikes should be eliminated by compulsory arbitration or a secret vote of the workers, he said. The great need is for a balance between labor and management, and the free exchange of ideas between the workers themselves and management.

Rotary Hears Speech Team

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Bill Asks That Importation Of Workers Continue

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP) House leaders announced that a bill to extend authority for importing foreign farm workers until December 30 will be considered by the House Tuesday.

Under present law the authority expires June 30.

Rep. Phillips (R-Calif.) said the extension, to benefit California agriculture, should allow an additional three months to liquidate the program and transport foreign workers, principally Mexicans, back to their homes.

He told a reporter, however, that Californians will not press their request in the house at this time, hoping that the senate will write in a liquidation period provision to which the house will later agree.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3 (Special)—Forty-three pieces of used construction and automotive equipment will be put up for sale exclusively to veterans on March 8 at the Klamath Falls naval air station, Portland war assets administration announced today.

WAA said this will be the first site sale in Oregon employing the simplified plan permitting World War II veterans to purchase with discharge papers as the only identification requirement. Veterans in the Klamath Falls area will be offered equipment originally costing the government \$47,000.

Prospective buyers may inspect the equipment, offered at fixed prices, from 8 a. m. to 3 p. m. on March 8. Offers to purchase are limited to three items per customer, and lot drawings will be held at 3:30 p. m. at the sale site to determine the successful buyers.
