Sealed proposals will be received by the Common Council of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, for the purchase of street improvement bonds, Series 77 and 78, aggregating Fourteen Thousand, Four Hundred, Seventy-one Dollars (\$14,471.00), duly authorized by ordinance of the said City of Klamath Falls, for the construction and improvement of the following improvement units situated in Klamath Falls, Oregon, as follows:

Improvement unit No. 80, extending along Main Street from South Street to the North Line of Home Avenue; and Improvement unit No. 81, extending along Michigan Avenue from the North Line of Main Street to the South-Easterly line of Spokane Street and thence West along the Northeastly line of Michigan Avenue to the Southwesterly line of the U. S. R. 5 Canal right-of-way.

Proposals to purchase said bonds will be received by the undersigned up to and including the 10th day of March, 1947, at the hour of seven-thirty o'clock p. m. of said day and opened at a regular meeting of the Common Council immediately thereafter; said bonds shall be dated the 15th day of March, 1947, and shall be in amounts of \$300.00 each, except bond No. 1, of each series, which shall be in amount of \$100.00; said sum, and all shall be due ten years after the date of issue, payment of the entire bonds optional with said City at any coupon paying date on and after one year from the date thereof. Said bonds will bear interest at the rate of not to exceed six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on September 15 and March 15 of each year, principal and interest payable at the office of the treasurer of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon.
