M. on Tuesday, April 8, 1947, to lease the tide and overflow land known as Turpin Lake, in Wasco Valley, Lake County, Oregon, giving, however, to the owner or owners of any lands abutting or fronting thereon, preference right to lease, at the highest price bid, that portion of the lake bed fronting said owner's land, for a period of 60 hours after opening of said bids, provided such offer is made in good faith, and provided that the Land Board reserves the right to accept or reject any and all bids.

Teen Age Boys Held In Thefts

Four teen-aged boys are being held in juvenile custody today while city police and juvenile officials finish up working on a series of recent burglaries. The boys, one 16 years old and three aged 14, have admitted entering four houses and stealing an assortment of guns, ammunition, a camera, some money and other small items.

An apartment at 731 Oak. The youths also told of taking a Herald and News route book from a newspaper carrier and making collections. They said that they entered each residence during the day, staying away from school. Some of the stolen guns were later sold.

Former Klamath Policeman In Broadhurst Case

Sgt. Walter Walker of Oregon state police and in charge of the Ontario, Ore., office is credited with "breaking" the Vale murder case which is causing state-wide interest. Sgt. Walker was stationed at Lake and Klamath counties with state police for more than 15 years and last August was detailed to take over the Ontario branch and advanced to the rank of sergeant. The state of Oregon charges that Dr. W. D. Broadhurst, wealthy eastern Oregon cattleman, was slain in ambush and his chauffeur, Alvin Lee Williams, is charged with the murder and Dr. Broadhurst's wife, Gladys, is charged with complicity. Sgt. Walker, it is understood, obtained a statement from Williams that finally led to the charges which were ultimately filed.
