

British Buying Oregon Lumber
 PORTLAND, March 6 (AP)—Establishment of a British lumber procurement mission for purchase of Oregon-Washington lumber was revealed today by industrial spokesmen here. Lumbermen who declined to

be quoted said the mission has already placed orders for 260 million board feet of fir for delivery during the year. British Consul James McDonald said amounts to be purchased would be determined under export quotas now being negotiated in Washington, D. C. City Delivery Service, Ph. 8417.

NLRB Chairman Says Proposed Wagner Act Changes Strike Threat

WASHINGTON, March 6 (AP)—Chairman Paul M. Herzog of the national labor relations board said today proposed changes in the Wagner collective bargaining act could set off a nationwide round of strikes. But the U. S. chamber of commerce declared that "employers cannot rest easy" until congress rewrites part of the law to wipe out any question of its intent. The divergent views were prepared for senate and house labor committees, both of which are considering amendments to the basic labor relations act, along with other measures designed to reduce industrial strife. Herzog, whose job is to help administer the Wagner act, said the strike wave might materialize if all provisions of pending overhaul bills were adopted, even though "no strike could be lawful" under one of them once an employer had made a simple back-to-work offer. The NLRB chief put it this way in his statement submitted to the senate committee: "At best, several years of uncertainty and court litigation would flow from enactment of many of the proposals that amend . . . the act. At worst, American working-

men and their representatives would resent the destruction of rights they have so recently won that work stoppages would sweep the country." The chamber of commerce stand was outlined for the house committee by Herman W. Steinkraus, chairman of the business organization's labor relations committee. His testimony said "vast areas" of the Wagner act have been left to interpretation by Herzog's board. Because of "shifts in the board's policies," he said, "the employer has never known when a long-established administrative ruling would suddenly be changed with new and unforeseen results." Raymond S. Smethurst, counsel for the National Association of Manufacturers, told the senate committee yesterday pending bills to change the act have prompted several recent reversals of NLRB policies. He urged congress to act anyway. Herzog took note of this situation, saying the trend has been to write into NLRB decisions principles which some congress members want to put into law. Explaining the trend and asking a go-slow approach on legislation because of it, the board chairman said: "Members of the board are acutely aware of the fact that all the solutions which seemed appropriate under the industrial conditions that existed some years ago need no longer be followed in administering an act that wisely permits flexibility and gradual change."

Bremerton Teacher Strike Scheduled

BREMERTON, March 6 (AP)—Protesting the legislature's delay on measures to provide teachers' salary increases, the Bremerton Federation of Teachers (AFL affiliated) will strike Friday, President Harold Paschal announced last night. He said a steering committee voted unanimously to make the walkout effective as of the start of the school day Friday, under authority of the union membership. The strike would affect 283 instructors, of whom 188 are members of the union. It would close 11 schools having an approximate enrollment of 7100.

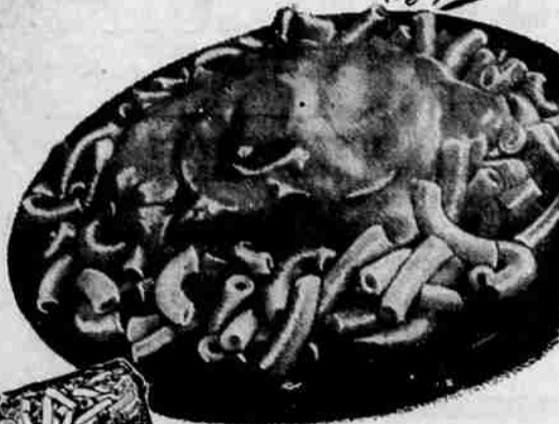
San Jose Goes Without Milk

SAN JOSE, Calif., March 6 (AP)—This city of 80,000 went without milk deliveries today because of a strike—with supplies on hand reported as sufficient for only 24 hours at the most. Deliveries were being made only to hospitals and nurseries. Stores reported limited stocks, accumulated because of the strike threat. George Jenott, of the AFL teamsters union, said truck drivers and plant workers voted 209 to 10 last night for a strike in support of demands for a wage of \$300 monthly compared with a present base of \$255.
