

# Fremont Has Big Tourist Trade In '46

LAKEVIEW, March 6 (AP)—An estimated 33,740 people visited the Fremont National forest in 1946 as compared with 28,855 visitors during 1945 according to the annual forest visitors report just completed. Forest Supervisor Merle S. Lowden estimates that these visitors spent a total of 84,445 days enjoying hunting, fishing, camping and other outdoor sports for which the Fremont is well known.

In order to make the stay of these visitors on the Fremont more enjoyable last year the forest service gave all forest camps a general housecleaning and rebuilt tables, stoves, garbage pits and sanitation facilities in camps receiving the most use. During the war funds and labor were not available to do this type of work. However, special funds were made available by congress in 1945 to finance a start on this job. In order to provide adequate sanitation facilities at all the more heavily used forest camps a program of work similar to that done in 1946 will have to be carried on for several years. This work can only be done as these special funds become available.

The forest service estimated that for every day each visitor was on the Fremont he spent locally an average of \$3.00 for gasoline, groceries, sporting equipment and miscellaneous supplies. This represents a total expenditure in excess of \$250,000 with local merchants.

# Phone Strike Notice Posted
