TULELAKE, March 6.—City fathers in a busy session this week took into consideration the welfare of Tulelake youth and babies in arms, the welfare of residents within the city limits who are disturbed by the passing of heavily laden trucks, speed limits, littered property, installation of city improvements and the need for finding a new man for the night police force.

Fresh Craters Erupt In Etna

CATANIA, Sicily, March 6.—A new and an old crater on the slopes of Mount Etna belched out hot lava today as the rumbling volcano, quiet since Monday, renewed its fiery activity.

The new crater, which opened above Monte Santa Maria at an altitude of about 7800 feet, emitted streams of hot, highly fluid lava which rolled steadily toward Monte Laguarda, near Randazzo, a town of 14,000 persons at the northwest perimeter of the 10,000-foot volcano.

While there appeared to be no immediate danger to Randazzo, some stations along the railroad circling the base were imperiled.

The Italian news agency Ansa said the flow of lava was seven and a half miles from Randazzo early today but that the town's residents were "in a state of lively alarm." It said the lava was moving at about 325 yards an hour on a front about 200 yards wide.

The old crater newly active was that near Passio Picciaro, which had subsided into quiescence after 10 days activity. The fresh lava from that crater was traveling slowly atop the old, cold stream.

does not appear on the indictment as a witness.

The police officer, specifically accused of beating Bob Lloyd Farris, a prisoner at the city jail, over the head with a pistol while Farris was being questioned in a morals case last April, has signed an affidavit that Judge Vandenberg went into the grand jury four times to testify against him.

As a prelude to this motion, Welch asked that a previously filed demurrer to the indictment, asking that it be dismissed because the facts as stated did not constitute a crime, be disregarded.

The motion being argued this afternoon, to quash the indictment, is based on charges that Judge Vandenberg used "undue influence and coercion" on the grand jury during the brutality probe last December.

Welch has subpoenaed several witnesses to take the stand during the hearing, including A. W. Macken, Frank O. Olson, William M. Clark and Fred H. Heilbroner, all grand jurors.

to work during last November's soft coal strike.

The supreme court's long-awaited decision was announced as the court met for a regular argument session.

Ordinarily, the highest tribunal announces decisions only on Mondays. Today's action caught all parties by surprise.

Chief Justice Vinson read the opinion of the majority.

Justices Murphy and Rutledge wrote dissenting opinions.

Justice Frankfurter wrote a concurring opinion. Justices Black and Douglas each wrote an opinion in which they concurred in part and dissented in part.

The court majority ruled that neither the Norris-LaGuardia act nor the war labor disputes act barred the government from obtaining the injunction which resulted in the contempt proceedings.

It was this injunction that Lewis and the miners union were accused of flouting.
