The emperor and empress, arriving in a horsedrawn carriage, were nearly mobbed when 80,000 Japanese broke through police ranks and attempted to touch their rulers. Beth, armed with a camera, was pushed up against a stone wall and used for a stepping stone by many of them who climbed to the top of a stone wall for a better view.

Her companion was shoved beneath the horses that drew the emperor's carriage but emerged unscathed.

She has attended several performances of the Nippon symphony orchestra which for the first time since before the war is again playing the music of great world composers.

Food and clothing in Japan is very scarce even though the rice crop was good this year and the contrast between supplies available for the Japanese and for the Americans in the country is startling to a westerner.
