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Work Asked On Streets By League

The Klamath Suburban league has recommended that Shasta way, Madison street and Washburn way be improved because of the damage done by bad weather and increasingly heavy traffic.

Because Washburn is a boundary street between Klamath Falls and an unincorporated area and is under the authority of the county and the city, the league suggests that a definite agreement for division of jurisdiction be arranged. Also, the league asks that both the city and the county agree to maintain their portions of the street to an "efficient standard mutually agreed upon."

Particular reason for the recommended improvement of Shasta way and Madison is the heavy truck traffic on the streets. The resolutions to pave the two streets will be turned over to the county court, and the resolution regarding Washburn way will be given to the county court and the city council.

Police To Talk Patrol

Police patrol techniques will be the main topic of discussion of the Oregon regional police school to be held in the Klamath Falls city hall Thursday afternoon. All public law enforcement officers in Klamath and Lake counties are invited to attend the class.

Thursday's period of instruction will be the first in a series of eight sessions on various phases of police work here. Lieutenant Keith L. Jones and Detective Ben I. Swank, both of the Portland police department, will conduct the first class. The session will also include discussion of police leadership in community affairs and law enforcement as a profession.
