Skin Grafted On Joe's Heel

BALTIMORE, March 11 (AP)—A skin graft will be performed today on the left heel of Joe DiMaggio to close a slow healing wound which has kept the New York Yankee slugger out of spring practice and probably will cause him to miss opening of the major league season April 14.

The Yankee clouter had a bone spur removed one month ago and the wound failed to close properly. Physicians said it will be four to six weeks before DiMaggio can expect to play after today's operation.

The skin for the graft will be taken from DiMaggio's body.
