Convention On Mission Plan

A missionary convention under the direction of Mrs. Hazel M. Kilbourne of the Oriental Missionary society, will be held on March 13 through March 16 at the Pilgrim Holiness church, Wantland at Division.

Mrs. Kilbourne has had 31 years of service in the missionary field in Japan, Korea, China, India and South America. She was a prisoner of the Japanese for two years, seven months of which were spent in a concentration camp.

The Oriental Missionary society is interdenominational and has been in operation for more than 40 years. The society has specialized in the training of a native ministry in its fields and has established eight Bible seminaries for training.

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Teacher Pay Plan Studied By Boards

Portland has a lower starting salary but increments increase more rapidly on the basis of \$200 per year. The Portland maximum is \$4500 on an 11-year period basis where our proposed schedule is \$4500 on the 13-year level. San Jose, Calif., schools have a higher starting salary but the average increment is slightly less and the year around average reaches a maximum of \$4800 in 15 years.

Incentive
At the present time, 55 per cent of the teachers in the Klamath Falls grade schools hold less than a BA degree. If the schedule is adopted, school officials feel that it will be an incentive for more teachers to continue study in order to get up into the higher pay brackets. Eighty per cent of all teachers in the grades are paid on a 12-month basis. Next year all teachers, both elementary and high school, will be paid on this basis, Gralapp stated.

No contracts in the city schools or high school will be signed until decision is made on the schedule. The average date of signing contracts is April 1, and it is hoped by both boards that the proposed schedule will be decided one way or another prior to that time.

In discussing the proposed schedule today, Robertson said that the OEA minimum recommendation is \$4500 in 16 years; NEA recommends \$5000 in 10 years, and CIO branch, \$5000 as the maximum pay.

No teacher can come into the city school system above the sixth level under the submitted plan. Experience is based on full credit for the first three years, and one-half year credit for the next six years. This gives a maximum teaching credit to newly assigned teachers at six years, taking into consideration their training rank, Gralapp said.

The present salary schedule, embracing the school year of 1946-47, starts at \$1900 on the basis of no experience and two-year training, to 30 years' teaching experience with an MA degree, for which the teacher receives remuneration of \$2982.50.
