

Klamath Man Weds In Church Rites

Word received from Camp McCoy, Wis., tells of the wedding of Lt. Esther F. Ferrell to Capt. Floyd S. Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd S. Johnson Sr., of Klamath Falls. The ceremony described in newspaper accounts as "the area's biggest military wedding," was read Sunday, February 23, at the post chapel.

Given in marriage by Col. Rudolph W. Broedlow, the bride wore a gown of white satin and net, with a fingertip veil of illusion net secured by a latticed crown of pearls. Her arm bouquet was of white roses and orchids. Chaplain Cathrinus Nettinga read the double ring service.

Vivienne Ferrell of St. Louis, Mo., was her sister's maid of honor, and bridesmaids were Betty Fisher of Lewiston, Minn.;

Lida Johnson of Tomah, Wis.; Rosalie DeBoer of Grand Rapids, Mich.; Rose Skwarek of Chicago; Lieut. Helen Eppinger of Milwaukee and Mary Kiefer of Mineral Point, Wis. 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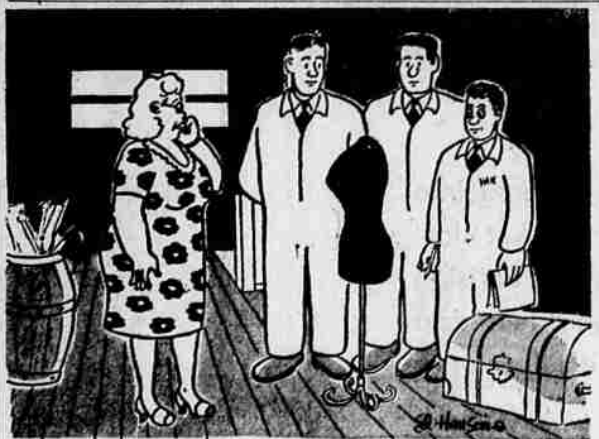
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President
