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Elmer McClay Death Told

Elmer Ellsworth McClay, 77, for 60 years a resident of Oregon and since 1911 of Klamath county, died Thursday at his home, 2215 Radcliffe. Mr. McClay had been ill for the past seven years.

Mr. McClay was born August 31, 1869, in Santa Clara county, Calif., son of Mr. and Mrs. David Barton McClay who came west during the year of 1858, from Missouri. Elmer McClay was educated in the San Jose schools and when 10 years of age moved with his parents to a ranch in the Bear Creek Buttes, 20 miles from Prineville. In 1890, he began falling timber for the Coos Bay Lumber company and became an expert in his field. In 1911, Mr. McClay purchased a ranch on Lost river.

Several years ago Mr. and Mrs. McClay retired to their home on Radcliffe street. Survivors include the wife, Maude, and four children, Marshall McClay of this city, Mrs. Gladys Foster, Milwaukie, Ore., Mrs. Grace Birk, Klamath Falls, and Mrs. Alma Pound, Myrtle Creek, Ore. There are also four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Final rites will be held tomorrow, Saturday, at 3:30 o'clock from the Earl Whitlock chapel with interment in Klamath Memorial park. The Rev. F. C. Wissenbach of St. Paul's Episcopal church will officiate.

Senator Morse reported that the matter of the diversion of clothing intended for overseas relief into other channels was under study by the senate committee on expenditures. Specifically he mentioned the like incident concerning the dress donated to relief by Mrs. Lars Midjass of Fairdale, N. D., which turned up in the possession of Miss Ohlheuser, Hazelton, N. D. Morse said that he thought the facts in the two cases were probably the same and enclosed with the letter a transcript of the investigation.

The transcript found that Mrs. Midjass' dress had probably been stolen by a clothing sorter working for the Salvation Army, and resold to a mail-order house for sale in large lot quantities.

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Texas Telephone Men Back On Jobs

DALLAS, March 14 (AP)—The walkout that silenced hundreds of thousands of Texas telephones ended today as members of the independent southwestern Bell telephone company union flooded back to their jobs.

The walkout, caused by a minor personnel dispute at Odessa, Tex., ended just seven days after the initial "continuous meeting" became statewide.

Governor Beauford H. Jester's action in naming a fact finding committee last night was credited with terminating the walkout.
