A Cappella Choir Here

The a cappella choir of Cascade college, Portland, will be presented in a sacred concert at the Klamath Temple, Tuesday, April 1, under the auspices of the Immanuel Baptist church.

The organization is composed of 36 carefully selected voices and has gained for itself a reputation throughout the Pacific northwest, having sung in the larger cities of California, Oregon, Idaho, Washington and British Columbia.

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French Claim Atom Secret

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., March 14 (AP)—Frederic Joliot-Curie, ranking French expert on atomic energy, implied today that France, too, knows how to manufacture atomic bombs.

In a highly technical article written for the magazine United Nations World, the French scientist, one-time assistant to Mme. Marie Curie, declared that the principle of the atomic bomb is "simple."

Without specifically saying in cold, black type that France has the "know-how" to build atomic bombs, Joliot-Curie, nevertheless, gave the impression that France can turn out atomic bombs too, and he added:

"We are thus approaching the third stage: that of practical application of atomic energy to improve the living standards of mankind."

A digest of his article issued by the United Nations World said that "France today has the know-how to build atomic bombs, according to Dr. Frederic Joliot-Curie."

The text of the article, however, does not include that specific quotation. Yet, the article is filled with obvious implications that France knows the secret of manufacturing atomic bombs but does not have the necessary materials.

American and British scientists who are expert in atomic energy are of the opinion that only the United States has the real "know-how" to build atomic bombs and that other countries are still in the experimental stage of atomic research.
