## Lakeview To Get New Laundry

LAKEVIEW, March 15—The service of a local, modern laundry was assured Lakeview this week when a lease was signed between Lloyd E. Ogil, owner of the former Consolidated Freightways warehouse, and Charles Porter and Glen L. Fabrick, both of Medford, for use of the building as a laundry site. ## Bauxite Deposits Found In Oregon

PORTLAND, March 15 (AP)—Deposits of laterite have been found in northwestern Oregon and Cowlitz county, Washington, and the aluminum industry is attempting to develop its own ore fields in the Pacific northwest, officials of the Alcoa Mining company told newsmen today.

Laterite is a low-grade bauxite, high in iron oxide and Alcoa officials have spent \$1,000,000 in testing samples, they said. The newsmen, on a tour sponsored by the National Association of Manufacturers and Columbia Empire Industries, were told that commercial use of the bauxite will depend on development of an economical process for extraction of alumina.

S. coast guard, Washington, D. C., to obtain application blanks. Applications must be postmarked and returned not later than April 1, 1947.
