

Luncheon Meeting Held Thursday

The Klamath Falls Soroptimist club met at the Pelican party room Thursday noon for a luncheon meeting.

Josephine Kittredge introduced the speaker, Cecil Kollenborn, general secretary of Klamath County YMCA. Mr. Kollenborn was a member of the national staff of YMCA in New York City for three years. He was also director of USO work in Bremerton, Wash. and in Maine. He has had special training at Columbia university, and for seven years was superintendent of a children's home.

Mr. Kollenborn gave a very informative talk on his organization, its purposes and its program. The movement was started in London June 8, 1844, by a group of six public spirited business men, who wished to better the group of men working for them. They realized the lack of facilities for leisure time and wished to fill the need for growth in body, mind and spirit. In six months the group had grown to 70 members, and spread to 14 business houses. The movement spread to Canada in 1851, and shortly after the first YMCA in the United States was organized in Boston, Mass.

Mr. Kollenborn said the aim of the YMCA is to cultivate and develop a strong family relationship.
