

Inter-City Visitations On Schedule

Plans for two inter-city gatherings—one a visit to Klamath Falls by a good will delegation from McMinnville, and the other a trip by Klamath men to an Alturas meeting—were shaped at Wednesday noon's meeting of the Klamath County chamber of commerce directors.

The McMinnville gang, numbering from 15 to 25, will be here next Tuesday, on a statewide tour in cooperation with the tourist committee of the Oregon Advertising club. The tourist committee of the chamber of commerce will take charge of hospitality, and probably will provide dinner for the guests upon their arrival that evening.

Al Hattan, chairman of the chamber of commerce, said that a group of at least 30 is wanted to go to a meeting of the Modoc council of natural resources to be held at Alturas next Wednesday evening.

Chamber members who have business relationships in Modoc county and any others interested are asked to make immediate arrangements at the chamber of commerce for making the trip to Alturas. The party will go down in the late afternoon, enjoy dinner in Alturas, and return home that evening.

President John Houston reported that the chamber had presented sets of farm account books to the new Tululake homesteaders.

The directors went on record favoring the establishment of a national monument at old Fort Vancouver, Wash.

Amphibian Rescues Two

TAMPA, Fla., March 20 (AP)—Two sun-blackened Virginians were recovering from exposure and near-starvation today after being adrift 11 days in a small power boat in the Gulf of Mexico.

The two men, W. Horace Blanchard, 32, of Newport News and Charles King, 18, of Hampton, were able to talk of their dramatic rescue yesterday by an army amphibian only a few hours before a search which covered 50,000 square miles of gulf waters was scheduled to end.

They told of long hours of hunger and cold as they tossed in their 22-foot cabin cruiser, and of using their last flare in a desperate gamble to attract an army search plane from MacDill field.

"I guess we've been lucky," Blanchard said, lying on a hospital bed at MacDill field. "The only things that saved us were the Lord, a stout boat and the army air forces."

White House Calls Off Egg Rolling

WASHINGTON, March 20 (AP)—The White House is not going to revive its pre-war Easter egg-rolling on the executive mansion grounds.

Mrs. James Helm, White House social secretary, told reporters today that it was an "orgy of wasted eggs" and that Mrs. Harry Truman is opposed to wasting food when many countries are near starvation.

The egg-rolling custom began many years ago and grew until during the Franklin D. Roosevelt administration children gathered by the thousands.

100,000 Acres In Tree Farms Now

PORTLAND, March 20 (AP)—The West Coast Lumbermen's association said today that nearly 100,000 acres of timber in Oregon and Washington were certified as tree farms this week.

It brought the northwest's tree farms—land operated on a sustained yield basis—to 2,293,731 acres. The new farms are 41,600 acres of Oregon Pulp and Paper company in Polk, Lincoln, and Linn counties of Oregon, and Pope Talbot's 53,300-acre Hood canal tree farm in Kitsap county, Wash.

Moose Lodge Addition Asked

The Klamath Falls lodge, Loyal Order of Moose, has filed application with the civilian production administration, Portland, for a \$35,000 three-story addition to the Moose hall at 1010 Pine.

Preliminary plans drawn up by Sheldon Brumbaugh, architect, call for an addition to the present structure including a full basement and two additional floors. The basement will house a modern recreation room and the other floors will be used for improved club facilities and a larger lodge hall. The building now in use was purchased by the Moose lodge from J. Hirvi in 1939, and was completely remodeled. The building has proved inadequate for lodge needs, however, and the addition is sought for this reason. If CPA approves the construction, bids will be called for immediate work according to Brick Leach, chairman of the building committee.

New Medical Unit To Incorporate

Articles of incorporation have been filed with the county clerk's office for the establishment of "The Medical Laboratories." The articles were signed by Lenore E. Martin, Lorain K. Meyer, and Clayton J. Burrell, joint stockholders in the new Klamath venture.

Burrell said that the firm will deal principally with analytical and research work for the medical profession of Klamath county.

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Thompson Blasts At Talmadge

ATLANTA, Ga., March 20 (AP)—Gov. Melvin E. Thompson declared today that Herman Talmadge and his political associates no longer had the right to speak for the democratic party, and branded the Talmadge-sponsored "white supremacy" legislation as an invitation to fraud and stolen elections.

Appearing before a joint session of the Georgia legislature, just 24 hours after the state supreme court had rejected Talmadge's claim to the governorship, Thompson said:

"Those who sought to seize the state of Georgia for their selfish ends, and who undertook to prosecute the democratic platform to extend their own reign, now have no right to speak for the democratic party."

"Their program is not the people's program. It is not the democratic program, it is not my program. No selfish group can exploit Georgia, and no selfish group will ever control Georgia so long as elections are free."

Thompson, who must pass on 151 bills apparently signed illegally by Talmadge, indicated he might veto Talmadge's number one measure, the so-called "white primary" bill.

He declared, however, he favored restoration of the democratic white primary, and asked enactment of legislation which would set rigid education requirements for voting and provide separate voting booths for white persons and negroes.

Thompson turned stinging rebuke on Talmadge for his attempt to bar negroes from the polls by removing primaries from state control and making them subject only to party rules which could exclude any voter, white or negro, if not acceptable to the party.

Right Rev. Perry Dies At 76

SUMMERVILLE, S. C., March 20 (AP)—The Right Rev. James DeWolf Perry, former presiding bishop of the Episcopal church in America, died suddenly today. He was 76 years old.

Bishop Perry, a resident of Providence, R. I., fell dead on the steps of a Summerville inn which he was entering to visit a friend.

In the first World War he served as senior Red Cross chaplain with the American forces.

Ten Firms Face Sugar Charges

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Mar. 20 (AP)—Ten corporations, including the Dr. Pepper Co. of Dallas, Tex., and 38 individuals from eight states were indicted by a federal grand jury today on charges of conspiracy to violate sugar rationing regulations.

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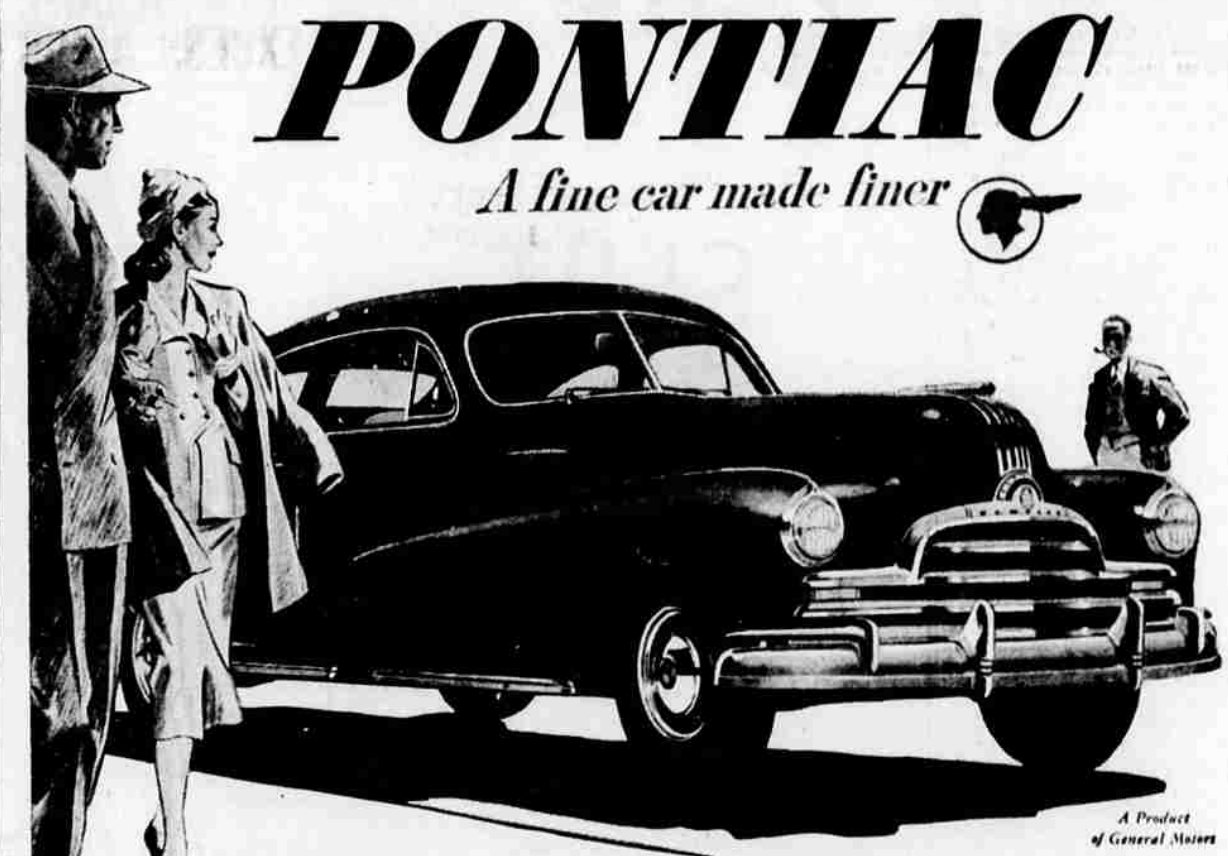
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
