Wonderland Is Mag Feature

Pictures and stories of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland are featured over four pages of the February issue of "County Officer," the official publication of the National Association of County Officials.

Sub-titled "Horace Greeley—1947 Edition," the article urges the adoption of Greeley's dictum about "Go west..." The beauties of the wonderland are graphically portrayed with photos of Mt. Shasta, Crater lake, antelope silhouetted against the setting sun near Lassen, ducks rising in the morning mists from Eagle lake, motorboats on Lake o' the Woods, skiing at Mt. Lassen, rodeos, hikes, rides and gold.

The article points out that the wonderland "embraces six counties in northern California and three in southern Oregon. It is as large as the state of Ohio but has a population only equal to that of San Diego. It adds... containing some 35 million acres, 10,000 miles of highways and at least 2500 lakes of every hue, size and description."

Freighter Pulled Off Mud Shoal

SEATTLE, March 21 (AP)—Fast on the foul weather shoal, 25 miles down sound since Wednesday morning, the 10,700-ton Lawrence Victory arrived here after three seagoing tugs pulled her free at high tide early this morning. She went aground in a heavy fog en route from Seattle to Port Gamble and was returned here for survey after a barge pumped 5000 gallons of fuel oil from her tanks to lighten her to aid the tugs.

Flames Destroy Small Tool Shed

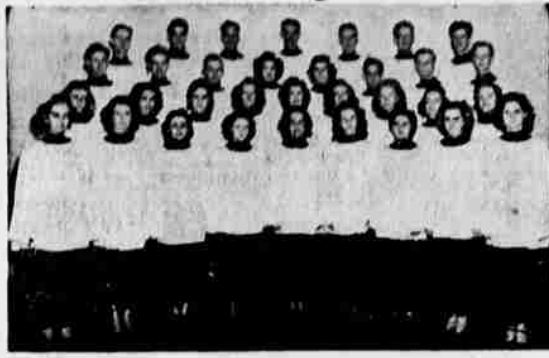

Youths Tell Of Staging "Perfect Crime" In Eugene

The "perfect crime" which fooled eight witnesses and had Eugene police combing the country for some clue to the mystery shooting and beating of an unidentified body on a Eugene street after the final game in the state basketball championship playoffs last Saturday, was finally broken yesterday with the aid of a tip which made one of the culprits "talk."

Among the witnesses to the incident were Paul Deller, KUHS track coach, Claude Cook, Bend athletic director, and Al Lightner, sports editor for the Salem Statesman. All swore that they saw a man running down the street, a car coming swiftly from behind him, a hand reaching out to shoot, the body rolling to a "dead" stop. Then, according to the report, several men jumped from the car, beat the fallen man, thrust him into the car which then sped away. The police were immediately called and a city-wide search for the car, the culprits and the victim was begun. Deller had managed to obtain a license number which was traced to a pick-up truck in Estacada. The police were stymied.

Tuesday the police were in

formed by a "hot tip" and a 17-year-old Eugene youth admitted that he and three pals from Portland had staged the affair as a prank. The "fatal" shot had been a firecracker, the beating was make-believe, and the abduction of the "victim" was merely a device to effect a clueless getaway.

The reported discovery of a body, that of a store dummy, floating down the Willamette river and dressed in swimming trunks, was only a coincidence, according to police after they released the youth.

The "punishment" for the pranksters will rest with their parents, police said. They will all receive letters from the police department detailing their sons' "perfect crime."
