Iron Shipment Curtailed

BERLIN, March 21 (AP) — A joint British-American announcement said today that British and American authorities had sharply reduced shipments of German iron and steel to the Soviet zone and were considering a total embargo because the Russian zone has failed to fulfill terms of a trade agreement.

The joint statement said the Soviet zone was lagging far behind its commitments under the agreement with the combined American-British zone to deliver foodstuffs and various other materials in exchange for steel and iron.

On the other hand, the statement said, deliveries of iron and steel up to the end of February had fulfilled 95 per cent of the British-American commitment.

"This failure (of the Russians) has placed the United States-British zone in an extremely difficult position," the statement asserted.

Copper Import Limit Proposed

WASHINGTON, March 21 (AP) — Duty-free copper imports would be limited to 400,000 tons in a one-year period if Senator McFarland (D-Ariz.) has his way.

He wants to amend legislation passed by the house and pending in the senate which would suspend duties on copper imports, without any tonnage limits, for two years.

McFarland and 10 other senators have signed his proposed amendment.

Timber Auction Date Named

PORTLAND, March 21 (AP) — The first timber auction instead of traditional sealed bid sales will be held early in May by the U. S. forest service on 76-187,000 board feet of Columbia national forest timber.

The stand lies near Packwood, Wash. U. S. forest service officials said the auction method might avoid the possibility of a firm, dependent on obtaining the timber to remain in business, being forced to bid unnecessarily high. Recent sales have brought record prices.

Minimum prices will be set for the auction. The sale will also allow for reappraisal in April, 1949, should market conditions change decidedly.

State's Attorney Charles G. Seidel and Sheriff Byron R. Scott said the inmate, a young Chicago girl, had fled from the infirmary, went into the school's hospital nursery and kidnaped a negro baby, daughter of an inmate.
