

Ellsworth Urges Congress To Act With Caution In Acting On Greek Move

WASHINGTON, March 22 (AP)—Congress should not act in haste on President Truman's proposal to aid Greece and Turkey, Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) said today.

The plan, Ellsworth said in a statement, involves a choice "between a further policy of appeasement and ultimate total failure, or a gigantic gamble that we can back the Russian

government down with firmness."

Most members of congress, Ellsworth said, feel they must have further information concerning the need of sending troops and aid to Greece and Turkey before they vote. He said the president's request for haste was "unwise and unfair" because a quick decision might lead "to a bad decision."

The situation in Europe was no surprise to the state department and the president as it has been building for months, he said, and if harm comes from delay "lay the blame at the door of the president."

Ellsworth said that after the conclusion of the shooting war this government thought it could achieve peace by negotiation aided by the formation of a United Nations organization, and continued:

"Unfortunately our policy until only recently has been an effort to achieve our objectives on the basis of appeasement, the whole picture in Europe being deadly similar to what it was just prior to Germany's march into Poland."

"We must now choose between a further policy of appeasement and ultimate total failure, or a gigantic gamble that we can back the Russian government down with firmness, properly supported with money and men. Can we afford to make the big wager—that is by proper show of determination and force, can we achieve the final victory? The Russian government will know whether or not we can and will successfully back up what appears to be a bluff. We must be perfectly certain in our own minds before we take the risk."

The speaker objected to the president's policy in that such aid to Greece and Turkey is an implied declaration of war, that such aid is merely a token in military activity, that it commits the U. S. to complete world conflict if Russia takes up the challenge, that communism still would survive even if Russia were crushed as a world military power (we have not stopped communism in the U. S.) and that from a monetary standpoint it starts us on a road that has no ending.

As an alternate program, Ellsworth advocated that the U. S. state department urged the United Nations to consider this problem, that if the UN declares help needed in Greece and Turkey, that Great Britain should administer it and the U. S. give its full share of aid, that if the U. S. fact finding committee now working in these countries recommends that the U. S. should give them aid, the help should be given through the United Nations.

Bosworth summarized by saying that communism is a political and economic ideology, which can be supplanted only by a better idea. This can be done only by strengthening democracy. He strongly urged that his listeners express their own views immediately to their congressmen. Bosworth was introduced by Bert Hall.

Benny Larson, KUHS Rotary member, introduced Coach Wayne Scott, who in turn introduced Paul McCall, assistant coach, and members of the state runner-up Pelican basketball team.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 22 (AP)—The United States must build more ships and the west coast would be a good place to build them, believes Joseph K. Carson, newly appointed member of the maritime commission.

The former Portland, Ore., mayor visited San Francisco today in a tour of Pacific coast maritime installations.

"If we're going to have ships capable of competing with other nations in foreign trade we're going to have to build more ships," he said.

"The record of the Pacific coast toward the end of the war in shipbuilding suggests it would be a good place to build some of these ships."
