

Picture Studied At Club Meeting

The "picture" meeting of the Toastmistress club was held at the home of Mrs. Anne Price on North Ninth street Wednesday, March 12, with Mrs. Anne Price as toastmistress.

The picture, "Grey and Gold" by John Rogers Cox was shown to the members and each one gave an impromptu speech on what she saw in the picture and what her title would have been had she painted it.

"I would call the picture 'Cross Roads of America,' said Mrs. Leon Kitchin, "because I see the result of the American pioneer spirit, necessary to create this security of freedom from want and all as typified by the billowing fields of ripe grain as seen from a country crossroad, and the storm clouds hovering in the background are a reminder that unless we keep this spirit alive, we can easily lose our heritage."

"Thank God for the Land" would be my title for the picture," said Mrs. Catherine Child-ester. "I see the typical American character of the man who planted the fields. The straight rows signify a straight purposeful life and the ripened grain gives him a feeling of a job well done."

"I see a great anxiety in the hearts of the people gathered in the home watching the storm clouds roll over the land," explained Mrs. A. P. Heup giving her title for the picture as "Storm Clouds Gather." "They have worked and waited for the maturity of the grain and realize that a year's effort may now be destroyed in such a tiny space of time."

"To me the picture represents 'On the Brink of Disaster,'" said Mrs. Helen Mueller, "as I can see the other years of crop failures and now this one bountiful crop makes up for it all. The dark background is smoke and the feeling of hope and prayer that a change of the wind will save the crops is very strong. I cannot help comparing this picture with our present world situation today where a 'change in the wind' in world policies might mean freedom or disaster for all."

"Vanished Fear" would be my title for this picture," said Mrs. Rufus Quillen, "because as the storm clouds roll away the anxiety and fear for the harvest is forgotten. The beauty of the golden grain fields has been heightened by the threatened danger."

"Wheat means bread for the world," said Mrs. Anne Price, "and this storm rolling in over the land is a menace to all hungry people. I would call the picture 'Threatened Breadbasket' because the angry clouds presage famine and all its attendant heartaches."
