

Oregon State Drops Game To Sooners 56-54

KANSAS CITY, March 22 (AP)—The University of Texas Longhorns will throw their buzz-saw at a durable and methodical Oklahoma university quintet in a play-off for the western regional basketball title tonight.

Oklahoma upset the highly regarded Oregon State Beavers, Pacific coast champions, 56-54, and Texas skinned by the Wyoming Cowboys, 42-40, before 8526 paying customers last night.

Coach Bruce Drake's Oklahomans came up with the smoothest game of the evening, jumping away to a 14-point lead in the first 12 minutes of play, and nipping a strong Oregon State late-game rally.

Oklahoma's accuracy at the free throw line proved the pay-off. The Sooners hit their first 12 charity tosses and had 16 out of 23 for the game. Gerald Tucker and Paul Courty each scored 17 points for Oklahoma.

Low Beck led the late Beaver rally that netted nine points in two minutes and tied the game at 46-all with seven minutes remaining. Beck's 20 points topped individual scorers for the two games.

"We were beaten by a great team—a great defensive team," Coach Statts Gills of Oregon State said. "We lacked tournament experience, but what got us was that Oklahoma defense."

But for a backfire in strategy, Wyoming could have been meeting Oklahoma for the right to represent the west in the NCAA finals at New York next week.

The Cowboys had the speedy Texans nailed down to slow motion and were ahead by a single point, 40-39, when they elected to stall out the final four minutes of play. A free throw by Al Madsen knotted the count at 40-all and a long push-shot by Slater Martin brought the Texas victory.

Wyoming led 27-24 at half-time. The lead changed 18 times, but the Cowboys were in front most of the contest.

Floyd Volker, who played a great defensive game for Wyoming, and John Langdon, Texas center, each scored 11 points.

Oregon State and Wyoming will play for consolation honors starting at 5:45 o'clock (PST). Texas and Oklahoma will follow for the title at 7:30.

Track Men Open Year

FORT WORTH, Tex., March 22 (AP)—Teams from 38 colleges swung into preliminaries today in the southwestern recreation track and field meet with all eyes on a sprint feat between Flynn Charley Parker of Texas and Bullet Bill Martinson of Baylor.

These two stars, who met for the first time two weeks ago at the border Olympics when Martinson snapped Parker's five-year winning streak, were not in the same heats but the times of the two fliers were watched with interest. J. D. Stovall, Martinson's coach, has said Parker will have to better 9.6 for the 100-yard dash to beat Martinson in this afternoon's finals.

However, Stovall evidently thinks Parker will do it and break the meet record of 9.6 set by Cy Leland of Texas Christian in 1930 and equalled twice by Peyton Glass of Oklahoma A and M in 1931 and by Harold Hall of Rice in 1942.

Ohio Favored In Swim Meet

SEATTLE, March 22 (AP)—Ohio State university will rule a heavy favorite to retain its 1946 championships at the national collegiate swimming meet here March 28-29. The Buckeyes easily won the Big Nine crown this season with a star-studded squad that rolled up 83 points.

Twenty other schools from all parts of the country have entered teams.

Individual champions who will be on hand to defend their titles include Charles Keating, Cincinnati, 200-yard breast stroke; Halo Hines, Ohio State, 100-yard freestyle; Bob Anderson, Stanford, 50-yard freestyle; Jack Hill, Ohio State, 220 and 440-yard freestyle; Miller Anderson, Ohio State, one and three meter diving; and Richard Fetterman, Ted Robert and Jim Counsilman, Ohio State, 300-yard medley relay.

Entries have been received from Ohio State, Brooklyn college, Indiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Northwestern, Colorado A. and M., Michigan State, Purdue, Stanford, Yale, Cincinnati, Rutgers, Oregon State, San Jose State, Hawaii, Iowa State, Southern California, Nebraska and the host school, Washington.

Ski Men Pound Olympian Hill In Try For Record

HYAK, Wash., March 22 (AP)—The slick, snow-packed slopes of 300-foot Olympian hill took a pounding today as the world's top ski daredevils soared off the big jump, reaching for distance and a try at next year's Olympic games at St. Moritz, Switzerland.

Twenty-three Americans were listed to make two jumps today and tomorrow. In the two-day meet, in attempts to win one of the six to eight Olympic games squad berths. They will be chosen after the meet finishes.

Fifteen other entries, among them leading Norwegian, Swedish and Canadians, less concerned with the point-winning "form" in their jumps, were expected to go for distance and the national ski-jumping record mark of 289 feet. They are not eligible to compete for the U. S. Olympic team.

The late Torger Tokle, killed in Italy in the war, made a 288-foot jump here and also set the 289-foot record at Iron mountain, Mich., in 1942.

A heavy fall of snow last weekend and warm days during the week left the snow well packed, although rain late yesterday softened it again. Oscar Syverson, of the Eau Claire, Wis., Winter Sports club, drew the lead-off spot with his first jump set for 4 p.m. (EST).

Riggs, seeded No. 1, and Budge, seeded No. 2, won by identical scores, 6-1, 6-4 in the semi-finals last night before a crowd of 5,000. Riggs eliminated tennis' clown prince, Frank Kovacs of Oakland, Calif., and Budge, also from Oakland, overpowered Fred Perry of Miami, Fla., the former English Davis' cupper.

In a tandem doubles final tonight, Kovacs and Perry will meet Budge and Riggs.

HYAK, Wash., March 22 (AP)—The last-minute withdrawal of California left Washington a heavy favorite today to retain its title in the Pacific coast conference intercollegiate ski meet, with the jumping to be run off preceding the Olympics games tryouts of the country's top skiers.

The Bears notified Washington Coach Gus Eriksen they would be unable to make the trip and no other California school is entered.

Kjell Stordalen of Washington, who has been out since he was injured in the intercollegiate races at Sun Valley, Ida., in December, made a 253-foot practice leap this week.

Washington State and Idaho have both entered strong teams. Other schools represented will be Oregon State and Oregon.

The cross country competition will be run off Sunday and the downhill and slalom races Monday at Martin, Stampede pass, south of here in the Cascades.
