Idaho Snowmen Lead Field By Slim Margin; Oregon State, Oregon Trail

STAMPEDE PASS, Wash., March 24 (AP)—The Pacific coast conference intercollegiate ski meet moved toward its final events today with a three-way race for laurels.

A strong University of Idaho snow squad came back strong in yesterday's 5.3-mile cross country run to move ahead of the five-school field with 189 points to Washington's 174 and Washington State's 173. Oregon State is fourth with 65 points and Oregon fifth with 47.

## Oilers Top Oakland For AAU Throne

DENVER, March 24 (AP)—For the fifth consecutive year Bartlesville, Okla., was the national AAU basketball throne room today, for their fire-eating Oilers had done it again.

Bartlesville (Phillips 66) topped the ambitions of Oakland, Calif. (Bitters) 62-41, in the Saturday night finals of the AAU basketball championships in Denver and there was no doubt as to what club was boss.

Although Oakland sports such sleek basketball high-pointers as Jim Pollard and Paul Napolitano, the Oilers, sparked by veterans Gordon Carpenter, Cab Renick and Marty Nash, took the game into their own hands from the start.

But it was in the last quarter, after a half-time score which saw Bartlesville ahead, 43-33, that the champs broke out the panic material.

Four of the championship club members were on the all-star 10-man squad. They were Gordon Carpenter, Cab Renick, Marty Nash and seven-foot Bob Kurland.

In the opening game the Denver Nuggets waltzed away with a 58-36 win over Seattle (Alpine Dairy) in a contest for third place. Seattle employed its fine precision ball game in the first half and managed to keep the score down, but in the third and last quarters the Denver club pulled steadily away.

## Four Yanks Grab Spots In Olympics

HYAK, Wash., March 24 (AP)—Over a hill that produced American record-beating exhibition leaps on two successive days, four top American ski stars clinched places on the 1948 United States Olympics ski jumping team before a Cascades mountain snowstorm blew in last night.

It was a field day for the mid-west ski riders. Three of the competitors named by the Olympics selection committee hail from the ski capitals of northern Michigan and the fourth from Minnesota.

They were, in the order in which they placed in the tough two-day competition: Joe Perault, Ishpeming, Mich.; Walter Bietila, Iron Mountain, Mich.; Sverre Fredheim, St. Paul, and Ralph Bietila, Ishpeming, youngest of the three famed jumping brothers.

Art Devlin, New York state's top jumper, also is expected to be a member of the team. He did not compete in the trials because of a recent injury.

While the Olympics candidates were concentrating on form, a chunky Norwegian, out for distance, stole the fancy of the crowd which Milwaukee railroad officials estimated in excess of 6000.

Arnold Kongsgaard of Kongsberg, Norway, who was freed from a Nazi concentration camp less than two years ago, leaped a stunning 294 feet on his second try of the day on the Milwaukee Bowl's Olympian hill.

It exceeded by five feet the 289-foot national record of the late Torger Torkle and was four feet ahead of the leap Kongsgaard made the previous day. It was on the same hill where Torkle set an American record of 288 in 1941—a record which he broke at Iron Mountain a year later.

## Beavers Out But . . . Oakies Aim At 6th Hoop Crown

KANSAS CITY, March 24 (AP)—The University of Oklahoma Sooners will be after the west's sixth straight NCAA basketball crown when they tangle with Holy Cross, the eastern champion, in New York's Madison Square Garden tomorrow night.

The Sooners came up with one of their greatest games of the year in beating a fine University of Texas Longhorn team, 55 to 54, in a frenzied finish Saturday night in the western NCAA playoff finals. A long jump shot by Kenneth Ryor, who played less than two minutes, gave Oklahoma the title with ten seconds remaining.

A Sooner victory in New York would mean three successive national titles for teams from the State of Oklahoma. The Oklahoma A and M Aggies have won the last two championships.

Oregon State's Beavers, who lost in the opening round to Oklahoma by two points, trounced the University of Wyoming Cowboys 63 to 46 in a consolation contest.

Low Beck, 5-foot, 10-inch guard for Oregon State who hit for 20 points each night, led the four teams in scoring. Three times within a minute Beck intercepted Wyoming passes and dribbled in for goals that broke up a close game and gave Oregon State a 32 to 27 halftime lead.

## Ursal Snapp To Battle With Garcia For 10 Rounds

Ursal Snapp, the Merrill Marauder, highlights the main event at Tuesday night's boxing card when he tangles with Ray Garcia in the 10-round lightweight class.

Garcia, a newcomer from Denver, is reputed to be a hard hitter and a clever fighter from the word go, and promises to give Snapp, the fast moving local boy, a run for his money.

A five-round semi-final bout will match the big boys of the evening in a heavyweight bout between Gordon McKay of Henry and another of the six foot five lads, Johnny Jamieson of Klamath Falls. Jamieson is an ex-California scrapper, while McKay picked up his fistic accomplishments while serving with the army.

Bruce Miller and Joe Maravella, middleweights, will mix it up in a four-rounder, followed by second middle-weight battle between Bob Eastman and Don Pancho, also a four-round event.

Opener for the evening will be a four-round lightweight go pairing Rudy Carlson and Ralph Weiser in the ring.

Thursday night's wassle card will feature another split main event, the boys tossing a coin to see who fights the closing round of the battle.

Paired for the finals are the mysterious Gray Mask and Pete Belastro, along with Georges Dusette and Buck Weaver. Both events will run for five rounds.

Opener for the grapple card will be a match between fast Harry Parks of Canada, who meets his fellow Canadian, Frankie Hart in a three-rounder.

## Indians Close Hoop Season Downing Seattle

PORTLAND, March 24 (AP)—The inaugural season of the Pacific Coast Professional Basketball league bowed out last night with the Portland Indians taking a close 73-69 triumph from the Seattle Blue Devils.

The Indians, regular season winner but second to the Bellingham Firecrackers in the post-season playoff, will represent the league in the national professional tournament at Chicago April 15.

John Mandic paced the Portlanders with 21 points.

The Rose City five took a 53-44 win from the Blue Devils Saturday night while Bellingham was dropping a 54-52 decision to the Vancouver Hornets.

## Baker Voters Down Tax Measures

BAKER, March 24 (AP)—Baker taxpayers soundly trounced two out of three tax proposals in a special election here Saturday. Only measure to pass, and that by a margin of 467 votes, was a one mill levy for a sinking fund to be used for the purchase of equipment for the fire department.

Voters said no to a proposed \$55,000 bond issue for the purpose of matching federal funds to improve the municipal airport. The vote was 447 for and 607 against.
