

S. 6th Work Nears Finish

The S. 6th street improvement job, biggest construction setup of 1946, should be fully completed within the next six weeks as Warren Northwest, Inc., contractors, is expected to send a crew here around April 1 to complete sidewalks and put a seal coat on the pavement. This latter job hinges on continued good weather, a state highway men pointed out.

Mark Smith, who holds the lighting contract, last week started the installation of lights but was forced to hold up work due to lack of equipment.

A state highway survey crew started work at Malin this past week making a preliminary survey for widening the pavement and installing traffic separators, the work to be done this summer.

The survey crew working on the proposed north entrance route has staked as far as possible and will not stake further until complete plans of the highway are in the hands of officials, officials advised today.
