Klamath Model Plane Sets 101 Mile Speed Record

Klamath came back at Medford Sunday and recouped its losses from the previous model club meet with a new speed record of 101 miles per hour with a control line plane.

The meet, held in Medford and sponsored by the Medford Gas Model club, was attended by some 10 ardent model fans from the Klamath club, but due to windy weather only one plane was able to compete, the smaller ones failing to handle in the adverse weather.

The record breaking plane was owned by Bill Franks, and was flown and handled by Howard Renner, president of the Klamath Model club. The mark of 101 miles per hour set by the plane, a fireball with a hornet motor, is a new unofficial record for this area.

Medford placed second in the meet with a speed mark of 89 miles per hour.

Planes are under way at the Klamath club now to attend a Pacific coast meet at Sacramento in May, and a regional meet is being eyed for this area some time next month to choose possible entries for that meet.

Renner pointed out that the public is cordially invited to attend the model club's meetings, held at Pool's Bicycle shop on Thursday evenings at 7:30.

Huskies Tack Up College Ski Honors

STAMPEDE, Wash., March 25 (AP)—The University of Washington snowmen tacked up the Pacific coast conference intercollegiate ski hunting today after closing the three-day meet with victories in the slalom and downhill events.

Combined events team scores placed the Huskies on top with 362½ points with Washington State second at 332½. Idaho, the second day leader, dropped to third in the final standings with 312 followed by Oregon State with 172 and Oregon at 119.

Rees Stevenson, Washington speedster, paced both of the meet's final events, winning the slalom in 72.6 and the downhill in 53.4.

Washington State's Bruce Berg trailed him home at 79.4 in the slalom and 57.4 in the downhill.

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Here's Baseball Situation . . . Angels Get Pitchers; Ball Tempest Shifts

SARASOTA, Fla., March 25 (AP)—The investigation into "who said something insulting about whom, if anything," which is creating major league baseball's current tempest, has been continued until Friday and shifted to St. Petersburg by Baseball Commissioner A. B. (Happy) Chandler.

The hearing, heralded as baseball's spring house cleaning session, dragged on for five hours yesterday as the lesser men involved in the case reported to Chandler on their knowledge of the affair which stems reportedly from remarks made by Durocher and Rickey unflattering to McPhail.

MIAMI, Fla., March 25 (AP)—Jerry Witte, regarded by many as heir apparent to the American league's home run championship that was vacated when the Detroit Tigers sold Hank Greenberg, king of the round-trip wallopers, to the Pittsburgh Pirates, is beginning to find the four-base range.

The 29-year-old first sacker who wound up the American league campaign with the Browns last year after clouting 46 homers in the regular season and three in the American association's all-star game while playing for Toledo has hammered four balls out of the lot for the Browns so far including two against the Brooklyn Dodgers' "B" team yesterday.

SARASOTA, Fla., March 25 (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals did not employ the "Dyer shift" against Ted Williams as they did against the Boston Red Sox slugger in the world series yesterday. However Williams only managed to draw a walk and a single in five trips to the plate as the Red Birds came from behind and beat the Carmine Hose, 6-4. Enos (Country) Slaughter who tallied the payoff run in the world series singled home the deciding run for the Cards.

SARASOTA, Fla., March 25 (AP)—Bobby Doerr, winged on the elbow Sunday by Cincinnati's Ed Erault, will not appear in an exhibition game with the Boston Red Sox until Sunday at the earliest. Doerr, who had heat treatments yesterday, will take it easy for a few days.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 25 (AP)—The New York Yankee regulars will attempt to snap a two game losing streak when they tangle with the Detroit Tigers today. The Yanks have dropped 3-0 and 8-5 decisions to the St. Louis Cards and Cincinnati Reds respectively while the "B" squad now has won four straight games including a 16-3 win over Syracuse yesterday that was featured by two home runs by rookie outfielder Cliff Mapes.

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 25 (AP)—The Detroit Tigers, who shut out Buffalo yesterday, 6 to 0, take on a big league club again today as they meet the New York Yankees here. FULLERTON, March 25 (AP)—Los Angeles Angels' Pacific Coast league pennant chances brightened today with the addition of Pitchers Ray Prim and Russ Bauers, released by the parent Chicago Cubs.

Prim, veteran southpaw, won 22 games for the Angels in 1944. Bauers, big righthander, won two, lost one in relief for the Cubs last year.

LOS ANGELES, March 25 (AP)—The San Diego Padres held a 3-0 decision in 11 innings over the Chicago Cubs as proof today that Manager Rip Collins' club is going to be a factor in the PCL race.

With Carl Dunler and Al Treichel combining to hold the major leaguers to four hits, the Padres exploded for five runs in the 11th to break a scoreless tie yesterday, in the Grapefruit league's best-played game to date.

The Padres were booked to meet the Los Angeles Angels today.

Utah Nabs Invitation Cage Title

NEW YORK, March 25 (AP)—Utah university's spunky cagers held the championship of the national invitation basketball tournament today as Oklahoma and Holy Cross prepared to take the floor at Madison Square Garden tonight in the NCAA east-west finals—and the possibility of a playoff between the two titlists was still alive.

Coach Vadal Peterson's Utah Redskins, who came into the invitation tournament without the prestige of a seeding, won the title last night by turning back the heavily-favored defending champions from Kentucky university, 49-45, before an approving crowd of 18,468.

Oklahoma, which won the western regional NCAA play-offs by beating Texas in the finals, and Holy Cross, conqueror of City College of New York in the eastern regional finals, meet in the second game of tonight's program. Texas and City College collide in the consolation bout at 7:45 p. m. (EST).

The Oklahomans are determined to end their season tonight, win, lose or draw, but Coach Doggie Julian of Holy Cross is agreeable to a meeting with Utah for the mythical national championship if his team wins and the game can be arranged for Thursday night, an open date at Madison Square Garden.

A committee of metropolitan coaches named Vern Gardner of Utah the most valuable player in the tournament.

not per man. It is 180 miles to Eugene, so the Klamath team receives \$72 for the round trip. The total of \$275 and \$72 is \$347.

In addition to the 11 men (10 players and coach) for which the OHSAA allowed expenses, Klamath had an assistant coach, manager, another player who deserted the trip, and Joe Peak, the athletics director, at Eugene.

Pelicans Lose Cash In Tourney

Klamath's basketball Pelicans helped to pack huge McArthur court with admission-paying fans at the state tournament, but they came home from Eugene on the short end financially.

The trip cost the Pelicans \$563, whereas the State High School Athletics association allowance will be approximately \$347. That indicates a deficit of \$216.

Under the state tournament arrangements, a participating team is allowed \$5 per day per player and coach as expenses. Klamath was allowed \$5 per day for 11 men, or \$55 a day. At the start, the state association officials figured on a four-day deal, but Joe Peak, Klamath athletics director, pointed out that the Pelicans were forced to spend at least five days at Eugene, and it is expected the allowance will be on a five-day basis. That is \$275.

In addition, the Pelicans were allowed 20 cents a mile for travel. That rate is for the team,

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
