Pelican Basketball Figures

Coach Wayne Scott Adds Numbers From Scorebook

Statistics on the recent Pelican basketball season were computed from the team scorebook recently by Wayne Scott, head coach of the Pels. LeRoy Coleman, captain of the Klamath squad and first-string guard, scored 136 field goals throughout the season and completed better than half his foul shots to emerge Klamath's high scorer, with 324 total points. In second place on the scoring end, Joe Zarosinski dropped 269 tallies through the net. Clarence Bussman, third, made 256 points.

Out of a total season of 32 games, 12 non-conference, 16 conference, four tournament, the Pels earned 1738 points against their opponents, an average of approximately 54 points per game. This total average, however, was lower than either the tournament or conference average, Klamath scoring 58 points as an average per game in the tournament, 59 points per try in conference play.

Coleman and Zarosinski tied for high-scoring honors in the state casaba, each getting 46 points. Gene Hoyer scored 41, Jerry Thorn, 38, and Bussman, 31, at the tourney, while Ray Craig earned the most on the second lineup, with 12 tallies. Bussman led the early, non-conference play with 81 points.

With the exception of tournament games, Klamath gained more foul shots than were called against them. At Eugene, however, the K-men ended up with a total of 83 personal fouls called for and against them. Thorn committed the most fouls, 18, in the four-game series.

J. Zarosinski was fouled more than any other Pelican, getting 114 free chances at the basket during the season. Hoyer was given 20 shots in the tournament games, though, to Zarosinski's 17. Hoyer also came through with the second best free throw record, center Charles Heilbronner's being only slightly higher.

AMVETS Ask Ball Probe

WASHINGTON, March 27 (AP) — The American Veterans of World War II announced today it is asking the justice department for legal proceeding against three major league baseball clubs under the selective service act.

The Amvets declared there has been "flagrant disregard for the re-employment rights" of Steve Sundra, former St. Louis Browns pitcher; Russell Kerns, former Detroit Tigers catcher; Benny McCoy, former Philadelphia Athletics infielder; and Bob Harris, former athletics pitcher.

All four of the players told the Amvets they were cut loose during the spring training season in 1946.

The selective service act provides that individuals discharged from the armed services must be restored to their former jobs if they apply within 90 days, unless the employer's circumstances have so changed that reinstatement is unreasonable or impossible.

The Amvets said it has asked the justice department to review a recent Los Angeles federal court decision against a rein-
