UNRRA Head Blasts Chinese Relief

PORTLAND, March 28 (AP)—Dr. Goodrich C. Schaffner, Portland physician and former UNRRA official, asserted that missionary funds for medical care to Chinese do not go to help China's ill poor.

Schaffner, who for a year was chief of obstetrics and gynecology for UNRRA in China, declared that mission-supported hospitals in China charge all patients, regardless of their financial status, at rates higher than those of the Chinese government hospitals.

Schaffner spoke to the Exchange club here yesterday and was to speak to the City club today.

Mrs. Richard Moss expressed surprise when the physician arrived, but he found her husband

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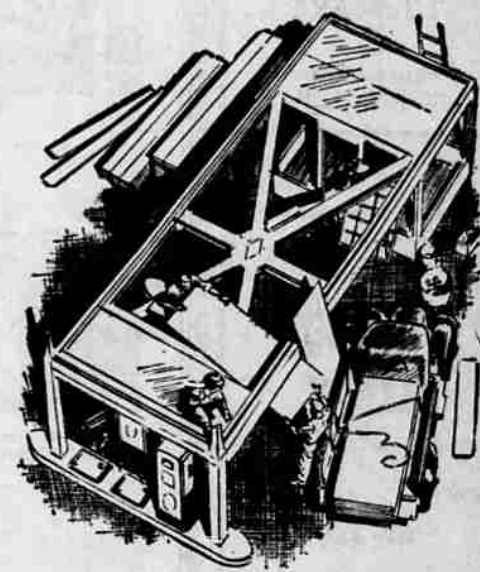
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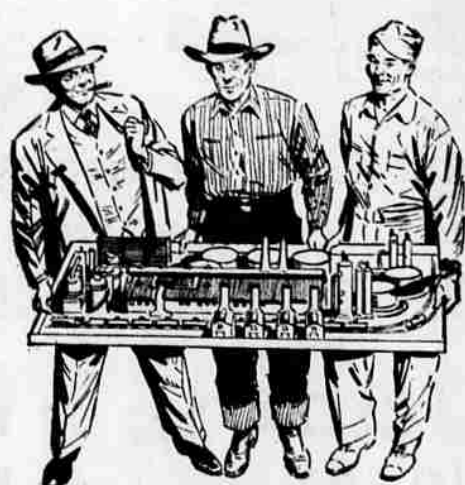
