

Angell Lauds GOP Tax Move

WASHINGTON, March 28 (AP)—Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) said today that he was in Congress to feel that taxes can be reduced "if we cut out all extravagance and waste" and eliminate unnecessary government agencies and functions.

"It is gratifying to see the republicans step by step carrying out their promises made during the campaign to reduce the cost of government, balance the budget and reduce the tax burden on the American people," Angell said in a statement after the house approval of the income tax reduction bill.

Angell also said he favored ridding the country of communists. "We should rid our house of these enemies of our country within our gates," he said. "The United States should not harbor within its confines men and women who advocate the destruction of our country and its overthrow by force."

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Transient Loses Foot

A Sparks, Nev., transient suffered painful injuries including the loss of his right foot when he was struck by moving equipment in the Southern Pacific yards late Thursday.

The man, Gonthier Damien, 71, said he had been here a short time and just prior to the accident had prepared himself a cup of coffee in the "jungle camp." He said he was crossing the tracks and did not hear an oncoming train. Damien was found between two tracks by Engineer L. A. Deer, who was operating an engine at the time, given by SP officials as about 6:40. Damien was conscious when found but did not know how long he had lain in the yards. He was moved by ambulance to Hillside hospital where the right foot was found to be mangled and amputation was necessary. Damien said he was en route to Idaho.

Youth Testifies In Own Defense

EVERETT, March 28 (AP)—Harold Richard Cameron, 18-year-old Kent section hand, took the stand in his own defense yesterday and told the jury he had been mistreated since the age of 4 or 5 by J. Lloyd Sisler, the 53-year-old Monroe contractor for whose death he is charged with first degree murder.

The youth said his feeling against Sisler burst into flame when his girl friend, Sonia McDonald, 14, told him Sisler had attempted to attack her.

Cameron's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Cameron of route 1, Kent, were in the courtroom for the first time as he testified.

Mrs. Clara Jester of Klamath Falls has received word of the death of her mother, Mrs. Margaret Herrmann, 85, in La Grande on Wednesday, March 26. Mrs. Herrmann had been ill for some time. Funeral services and interment will be held in La Grande late this week.

In addition to Mrs. Jester, she is survived by another daughter, Mrs. William Jacobs of Medford; a son, A. B. Herrmann, of Pollock, Ida.; a brother, H. P. Rowe of Enterprise, a grand-daughter and several nephews. Mrs. Jester went north Thursday.

Camp White On Block

War assets administration's sale of 1250 frame buildings at Camp White, Medford, will be open for public inspection with all priority restrictions off, this Saturday, according to Randy Jeuness, information chief of WAA, who was in Klamath Falls Friday.

The structures originally cost the government between \$13,000,000 and \$14,000,000 and are expected to sell for a small fraction of that amount.

Detailed information may be had from W. J. Sawiki, WAA negotiator at Camp White. The Portland office of WAA will receive bids up to midnight, April 7, and public opening will start at 9 a. m., April 11.

Park Travel Record Seen

Travel figures available from Crater Lake national park for the winter season thus far, give every evidence that this will be the record winter travel year, according to information from T. C. Parker, assistant park superintendent.

The season has two months to go, April and May, until records are maintained for summer travel. Figures compare favorably with pre-war travel for the same period, Parker observed. Since October 1, 1946, beginning of the travel year, 7966 cars and 27,412 persons have checked into the park, since January 1, 1947, to March 23, 5266 cars carrying 16,008 persons have gone into the lake area. At least 50 per cent are out-of-state cars and people, Parker said.

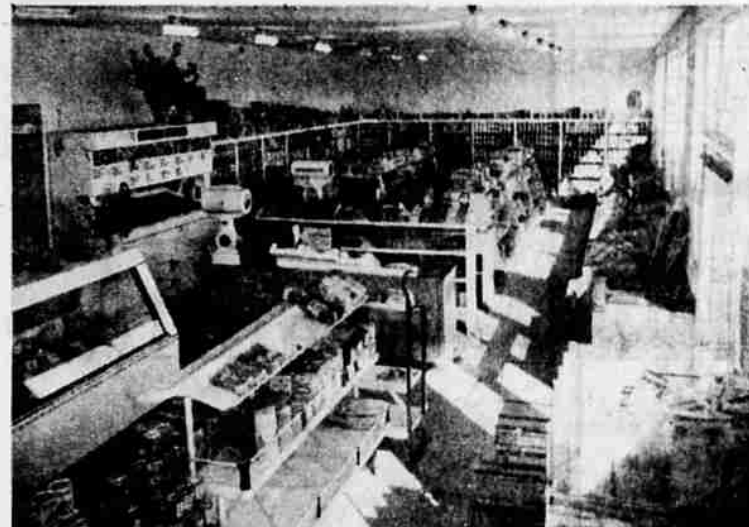
