

Ronnie Dimmick, 14-Year-Old Fremont High Student, Wins Annual Adler Award

Competition was exceedingly stiff at the third annual Adler award but unanimous decision of the three judges went to 14-year-old Ronnie Dimmick, Fremont Junior high school baritone at the final auditions held last night in the Fremont auditorium.

Talented youngsters from the seven city schools, all groomed to near perfection, presented piano, voice, violin, clarinet and drum numbers to a packed house. Judging was extremely difficult as the 19 musicians represented the best of the city schools' talent. It was probably the toughest assignment the adjudicators, Mrs. Samuel A. Mushen, Mrs. Robert Craig and Mrs. Lewis Hornby, have faced in the years the three have, themselves, been interested in music.

The \$100 award is presented annually by Dr. George H. Adler. It is given to aid further interest in music. Young Dimmick, who has been heard frequently in the eight years he has lived in Klamath Falls, said last night that he would use the money to continue the study of voice. At the present time he is a student of Mrs. Patricia Hunt. Ronnie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Pearson, 319 E. Main street. He is a native Oregonian, was graduated from Mills last spring into the junior high bracket, and is the third Mills student to win the award. Others were Athena Lampropoulos and Wayne Angel.

High praise goes to the other contestants for their excellent performance and, not least, their fine sportsmanship when the decision was announced by Andrew Loney Jr., director of music education in the city schools.
