

Rev. Matthews To Speak To Council

The regular meeting of the Klamath United Council of Church Women will meet Monday, March 31, at 2 o'clock in St. Paul's Episcopal parish house with Hazel Morrison, president, in charge. The Rev. Godfrey Matthews of the Community Congregational church will be the special speaker for the afternoon, his subject being "The Gate of Life."

Miss Morrison and Mrs. Charles Revell, who were delegates to the state convention of the Council of Church Women, will give detailed reports of those gatherings which were held in Portland in February. Mrs. Kenneth Lambie will give a report on the progress of the "Heifers for Relief" program which is a national effort among churches to give devastated countries a substantial start in building up their depleted farm cattle and provide milk for starving children. Local churches have been generous in their giving, but the quota for Klamath Falls is still short. The local Council of Church Women has assumed the responsibility of sending two live heifers abroad, the cost of each being \$160. Everyone is urged to bring used clothing, blankets, shoes with low heels or money donations to the First Christian church each Friday from 1 to 5 p. m. Women are on duty each week and receive the boxes through the Ninth street basement entrance of the church. At the meeting Monday, plans will be made for the May Fellowship Day, May 2. All women of Klamath Falls churches are most cordially invited to be present.
