Dairy Men Ask Testing Work

Dairy Herd Improvement association work was the subject of a Klamath dairymen's meeting Thursday afternoon in the county agent's office.

Those present were strongly in favor of reestablishing a testing association in Klamath. Testing association work enables dairymen to check on production of individual cows and to eliminate unprofitable animals.

A consideration of costs indicated that 20 to 25 cow herds could be included at a cost of around \$10.00 per month per herd. Herds over 20 cows would contribute an additional amount per cow on the number of animals over 20. A membership fee of \$10.00 per herd was suggested as a means of raising funds for necessary equipment.

A final meeting to organize an association is being called by Wilbur Reiling, Klamath Dairymen's association president, scheduled for 10:30 a. m. Friday, April 4, at the county agent's office.

Law Limits Motor Boat Speed

SALEM, March 29 (AP)—The house passed and sent to the governor Friday a bill restricting to 10 miles an hour the speed of motorboats of more than five horsepower during fishing hours on five lakes in southern Oregon.

The lakes are Crescent lake in Klamath county, Diamond lake in Douglas county, and East, Paulina and Elk lakes in Deschutes county.

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
