

Apartment Wall Resists High Wind

The east wall of the Evans apartment structure, 10th and Main, withstood a 47-mile gale Saturday and winds of slightly lesser velocity over the weekend, and at 7 a. m. this morning city police removed ropes which had been thrown around the area permitting two-way traffic on both sidewalks and streets.

Saturday's wind was highest since last fall when a 52-mile per hour wind raged through the basin, second highest velocity figure in three years.

The gale, whipping up from the south at mid-morning Saturday, took out the upper section of the rear wall of the fire gutted building and the east wall threatened to collapse under pressure. A crowd of Saturday shoppers gathered across the street from the building watching the wall buckle and sway.

Street Roped Off

Immediately after a report reached the city police station that the rear wall of the Evans apartment was crumbling under the force of the high wind, city police began roping off the section and permitted only one-way traffic on the south side of Main from 9th to 11th. The sidewalk from 9th to 11th.

The tile wall, braced at three points to steel girders, gave every evidence that it would collapse under the wind but at about 1:30 p. m. the wind shifted slightly to the west and the pressure was somewhat relieved.

William Kuykendall, attorney for the Evans family, said today that negotiations are still under way with the insurance company to reach a settlement as to disposition of the building, and advised that owners could not go ahead with razing the walls until an agreement was reached and the signal given. The insurance adjusters were in Klamath Falls only this week but no decision was reached.

The apartment house structure was destroyed by fire early the morning of February 18 and five persons lost their lives in the holocaust. Only the four walls remained.

Police and fire officials ordered early evacuation of buildings adjoining the apartment house, including the Horseshoe cafe, Rennie Jewelers, Gray real estate offices and the Whitehouse rooms, but business was resumed as usual when the danger was considered over.

Saturday shoppers, even those not craning their necks at the swaying wall, got an eye full today as the wind carried dust and dirt as well as a goodly amount of sawdust from the Consumers Heating company plant. It was typical March weather as far as the basin is concerned and darkened the skies for hours.

Veto Asked On Greek Loan

WASHINGTON, March 31 (P) Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) proposed today to give the United Nations a veto power over proposed American aid to Greece and Turkey.

At hearings by the senate foreign relations committee on legislation to authorize \$400,000,000 of aid, he suggested writing in an amendment under which President Truman would be required to halt the aid when and if the United Nations directed him to.

H. J. suggested amendment reads: "The president is directed to withdraw any or all aid authorized herein under any of the following circumstances:

"(1) If requested by any government of Greece or Turkey representing a majority of the people of either such nation;

"(2) If requested by a procedural vote in the security council or a majority vote in the general assembly of the United Nations;

"(3) If the president finds that the purposes of the act have been substantially accomplished or are incapable of satisfactory accomplishment."

Industry Calm In Face Of Flying School To Open Course

Production in the nation's bituminous coal pits was virtually normal today—the last day before a six-day work stoppage by 400,000 AFL-United Mine Workers in mourning for the dead in the Centralia, Ill., mine explosion.

Industry accepted the prospective curtailment of fuel supplies calmly. Normally, such a stoppage would cost 10 to 12 million tons in coal production but the mourning period ordered by Mine Union President John L. Lewis falls in a week in which much idleness would have occurred anyway.

The work stoppage comes in Easter week which this year includes the traditional miners' April 1 holiday. Few miners work on Holy Thursday or Good Friday. Saturday is an optional day for which miners who work receive premium pay. Thus, Wednesday will be the only full production day lost.

The rich Pennsylvania bituminous fields reported normal production and the West Virginia fields, most productive in the nation, reported no premature absenteeism.

One large group of miners called for removal of Interior

Secretary Krug as mines administrator.

Krug said he would not enter into the mine work stoppage. "My sympathy for the bereaved families," he said, "is too profound to permit me to debate or to gloss over their misery by engaging in any press controversy over the catastrophe or its causes."

The interior secretary stated he would make an early report to the senate on overall safety conditions in the nation's bituminous mines.
