

Democrats Recover Power In Chicago; Huge Majority Put Kennelly In As Mayor

CHICAGO, April 2 (AP)—Republican hopes of smashing the democrats' 16-year-old "big city" political dynasty lay shattered today under a tide of democratic votes that swept Martin H. Kennelly into office as Chicago's new mayor.

In the nation's first major 1947 test of political trends, the dem-

ocrats recovered from a stunning setback suffered in last November's congressional and county elections to score their biggest victory in a mayoral contest in 12 years.

Complete returns showed Kennelly's majority was 273,354 votes over Russell W. Root, his republican opponent. Kennelly's democratic running mates, Ludwig D. Schreiber for city clerk and Joseph T. Baran for city treasurer, also scored easy victories. The total vote of 1,586,941 was the largest in the history of a mayoral ballot.

Returns from the city's 4054 precincts gave Kennelly 919,593 to 646,239 for Root.

The republicans, who won 14 of the 17 Cook (Chicago) county officers last November, scored their only gains in the democratic dominated city council.

By winning 12 of the 19 runoff aldermanic contests, the republicans assured themselves of 18 of the 50 seats in the new city council, their largest representation since 1929, when they had 17.

Eastern Group Buys Pulp Mill

NEWBERG, April 2 (AP)—Control of the Spaulding Pulp and Paper company, major industry here since 1925, has been purchased by seven eastern paper firms which the company reported have been the major buyers of Spaulding's pulp production.

J. C. Compton, Spaulding president, said the eastern firms had purchased 9460 of the company's shares and yesterday named their own officers to the Spaulding board of directors.

Outlook Good For Easter

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—Chances of favorable weather Sunday for displaying Easter finery most places in the United States were described as good today by the weather bureau's Dr. Ivan R. Tannehill.

Dr. Tannehill is chief of synoptic (general view) reports and forecasts. The way he actually put it was this:

"We may expect areas of non-rain to be more extensive than those where rain is occurring."

To make sure everybody understands what that means, he added:

"In other words, the chances of experiencing fair weather in any particular locality are considerably better than chances of rainy weather."

And he topped off his forecast with a suggestion to check your local weather bureau—say around Friday or Saturday.

Teamster Parley Near Settlement

PORTLAND, April 2 (AP)—AFL teamsters and employers negotiating a new wage agreement were nearer a settlement today after the union scaled down its demands and employers increased their original offer.

The union's 1000 members have voted to strike if negotiations now going on with U. S. conciliation service aid break down.

Jack Schlaht, teamsters' secretary, said workers reduced demands from \$1.50 to a \$1.10 day increase but want a 40-hour work week instead of the present 48-hour week. J. M. Souder, employer spokesman, said operators had offered a 60 cent a day boost. Their original offer was 35 cents March 1 and 25 cents by October.

Land Management Offices Grouped

PORTLAND, April 2 (AP)—Grouping of federal land management offices of the Pacific northwest here progressed today with transfer of four field inspectors from San Francisco.

W. H. Horning, regional administrator, reported the men would check all land, timber, mineral and other field problems of the department of interior bureau.

The centralization of northwest offices here is due to be completed July 1. Most of the offices have been moved from Boise, Ida.
