

Housing For Transient Labor Big Basin Problem

TULELAKE, April 3.—Housing continues to be the crying need in this area if farmers expect an ample supply of transient labor to be available next fall, according to W. H. Anderson, of the local farm labor office. Anderson stated this week that requests for the barracks buildings at the former Japanese colony at Newell are not being received in as large numbers as anticipated and warned that the deadline for applications on these buildings is June 30.

White pelicans made their first spring appearance on Upper Klamath lake Wednesday morning, after spending the winter in other climes.

Seven of the large birds, typical of the Klamath country, were reported on the lake April 2 by a resident of Lakeshore drive, who said she had been watching for the return of the birds which have not been seen since the lake started to freeze last fall.

Council which has been allocated 423 buildings. Of this number the local office has okayed 69 for the Tulelake area of Modoc and Siskiyou counties; 85 for removal to Cedarville, Alturas, Davis Creek and Lake City; 32 to Butte valley for Macdoel, Dorris and Mt. Hebron and eight to Yreka, Fort Jones and Etna.

The system of allocation was worked out by H. L. Byrd, Berkeley, administration assistant of the council, and J. C. Vincent, administrative aide who spent several days here recently following transfer of the colony buildings to the CFPC by the U. S. bureau of reclamation.

The buildings have been allocated for housing and processing of farm labor in this locality. There will be no question of sufficient help this season if housing is provided and while some accommodations will be made available by the Tulelake Growers association at the military barracks at Newell, it is imperative that growers, wishing to eliminate travel to and from the camp, make provision on home ranches for taking care of transients.

Revamping of some military barracks at Newell to provide 2-room modern apartments for families and for single laborers will be completed before the rush harvest season. A "soup kitchen" will also be maintained during that time at the camp.

Anderson stated also that all plumbing fixtures in the utility buildings at the camp are to be sold in the near future at a low figure.

Douglas Ames of the farm labor office in Yreka is soliciting housing needs of farmers in the Scott valley, Butte valley and Shasta valley areas and anyone interested can contact him.

U.S. Eyes Muroc Try For World Speed Record Soon

WASHINGTON, April 3 (AP)—The next American try at the British-held world air speed record of 616 miles an hour will be made under recently liberalized rules, it was learned today from the National Aeronautic association.

Military and industry officials have indicated that the attempt may be made early in June at Muroc army air base in California with a modified Lockheed Shooting Star, the P-80R. This jet plane is now about ready for flight testing.

The rules changes include: Increasing the maximum altitude at which the plane may fly over the three-kilometer (1.86 miles) course from 246 feet to 328 feet.

Increasing the maximum altitude which may be reached during the record attempt from 1308 feet to 1635 feet.

Increasing length of the run-in or approach distance, during which level flight must be maintained before entering the measured course, from 1635 to 3275 feet.

Permitting the use of any two pairs of runs (one pair being a run in each direction), for calculating the average, instead of requiring the use of four consecutive passes. A plane may make as many passes as the pilot wishes, but no landing may be made between passes.

The British are understood to be waiting for the United States to set a new record before making another try with a plane regarded as considerably faster than the Gloster Meteor which flew 616 mph.

Many also were told that the mine management decided it was not "economical" to install a sprinkler system which was recommended by inspectors to keep down explosive coal dust.

A mine manager also testified that the blast might have been caused by "ignition from the miners' open flame lamps" which he said were in use despite their prohibition under federal law.

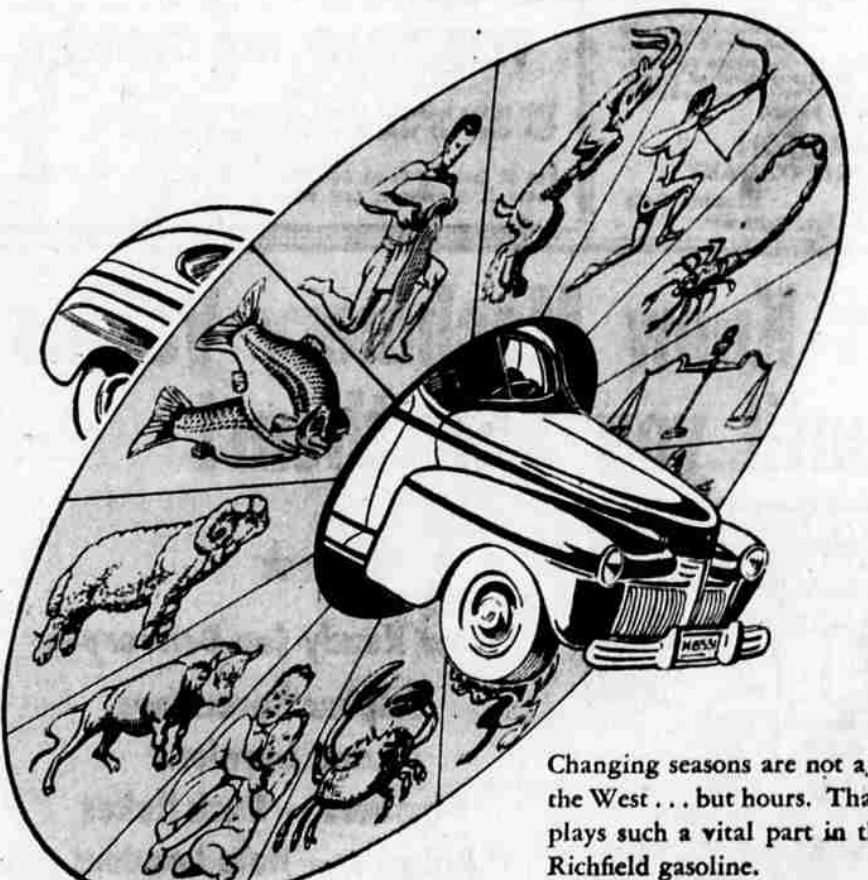

A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF OF STAFF

The Time of Need Is Now



The Selective Service System, which helped build so magnificent a wartime Army, is being discontinued as an immediate source of men for Army service. Its record is one of distinction, and the Nation's gratitude goes out to all those responsible for the efficient administration of that system, as well as to the millions of selected men who served with such courage and devotion.

From now on we are engaged in a great test, to see whether a system traditionally American in peacetime—the volunteer system—can give us the stable, well-trained Regular Army our current international commitments require.

We have come to a crucial turning point in the development of our military establishment. Building an all-volunteer Regular Army is not a job for the War Department alone; it is a job for the American people—a task of writing the insurance against the chaos of another war.

Here are the basic facts: To carry out our present assignments, we must maintain the Regular Army at a strength of 1,070,000 men. This will require a constant flow into the Army of 30,000 men a month. These men must be of high quality, and every one must be a volunteer. Thus we face a persistent question: Can we do the job?

The task is enormous. Never before have we even considered raising and maintaining a peacetime Regular Army of a million volunteers. There are no sign-posts to go by, no experience on which to base sure forecasts. But such obstacles have never deterred this Nation before.

I have confidence in the young men of America, whose opportunity it is to choose this fine profession. And I believe we can do the job—if we have three things: public understanding, public support and public action.

National observance of Army Day and Army Week is made possible by public support. This has come from the fine young soldiers who have volunteered, from individuals, and from organized groups. Now, as we strive to build a Regular Army to help enforce world peace and security, I ask those who have given so generously of their help to redouble their efforts.

They can do so in the knowledge that the United States Army offers able young Americans not only three things every man wants—good pay, a real career, a chance for advancement—but also the honor and dignity which is associated with national service in time of need.

The time of need is now.
