Lava Bed Notes

Travel into the Lava Beds national monument area from October 1, 1946, until March 31, 1947, was 20,869 as compared with 14,583 for the same period a year ago. This travel represented 39 states, Alaska, Hawaii and the District of Columbia.

Marmots and squirrels have reappeared after a winter hibernation. Deer are still quite numerous and wild flowers are beginning to bloom. Buttercups and mountain phlox are in blossom.

James B. Orr, recently appointed permanent ranger, is on duty and has rearranged the museum at monument headquarters.

Recently some fossil bones were discovered in one of the caves and have been sent to the University of California for identification.

While inspecting a cave near the former CCC camp, several Indian artifacts were found and it is planned to further explore the cave in the near future.

John O'Neil, maintenance man, has been on sick leave during the entire month of March.

Several new pieces of motor equipment, so badly needed, have been ordered for the monument.

Applications are being received from college students seeking summer employment. Several former employees have signified their desire of returning. It is expected that several additional positions in the seasonal staff as well as a small road crew will be approved by the national park service.

Indications of an exceedingly heavy visitation during the summer are evidenced by the

large numbers of requests for literature on the monument.

Custodian Don E. Fisher will leave March 31 for San Francisco to attend a conference on the fireplaces and several other matters in the national park regional office. He will be absent about two weeks and during that time Ranger Orr will be in charge. Mrs. Fisher will accompany her husband.

A two-point mule deer buck was observed still carrying both antlers on March 14. This is rather late for a deer to still have horns.

Mr. and Mrs. H. W. French, prominent amateur ornithologists, spent several days in the monument studying bird life. While the spring migration has not reached its peak, nevertheless, Mr. and Mrs. French were surprised at the number of birds they were able to identify in the area. The monument check list of birds shows that so far 116 different species have been identified.

Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Brown returned Sunday after a week in Medford. The Browns were called there to be near Brown's brother, Dell Brown, who was critically injured the previous week. Brown's left leg was amputated last Wednesday. The right leg was also badly broken and at first it was feared it
