

# State General Fund Left With \$3 Million Deficit

SALEM, April 3 (AP)—The joint legislative ways and means committee issued a financial statement today showing that when the legislature adjourns it will leave the state general fund with a deficit of \$2,927,000.

However, if revenues exceed estimates during the next biennium, the deficit might be almost wiped out. Should the deficit still be serious in 1948, then there probably would be a special election in November of that year to levy a property tax to make it up. This property tax would be offset by income tax revenues, so would not actually have to be levied.

The deficit also would be

wiped out if the people pass the 3 per cent sales tax bill.

The deficit estimate is based on the assumption that the legislature will approve such revenue measures as the cigarette tax, increased horse racing taxes, and transferring the amusement device tax to the general fund.

These taxes all have been approved by both houses, but agreement has to be reached on amendments to them.

The Rev. David F. Barnett Jr., pastor of the First Presbyterian church with Phil Hitchcock will attend the Easter addresses.

Warm coats are advised for those attending the services and blankets should be carried also.

In case of foul weather, plans are pending to hold the early services indoors, the place to be announced as soon as it is decided upon.

## Raver Lauds Power Plan

BOISE, Idaho, April 3 (AP)—Dr. Paul J. Raver, Bonneville power administrator, said yesterday the bureau of reclamation's plan for development of land and water resources of the Columbia river basin provides "for the first time... the mechanics for treating regional resources on a regional basis."

"Under this plan upstream areas such as Idaho and Montana will gain benefits from the riches of the river downstream," he told members of the Columbia basin inter-agency committee.

The report proposed ultimate construction of 238 irrigation and multiple-purpose projects in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, western Montana, Nevada and Wyoming. Net revenues from designated federal power plants would be pooled and utilized to help repay the cost of bringing water to the land on irrigation projects having no power facilities.

## Cattle, Sheep On Public Lands Cut

PORTLAND, April 3 (AP)—Livestock numbers on public grazing lands in Washington and Oregon will be scaled down about 650 animals on the 10 national forests during 1947, the forest service reported today.

L. H. Douglas, assistant regional forester, said less than 200 cattle of the total 80,000 would be denied range protection and that only 450 of the 244,850 sheep would be removed from the list.

Douglas said the adjustments were only minor this year because of the great decrease in total sheep on range in the two states since 1940. Douglas added that instability of the sheep growing industry was putting "sheepmen out of business" and not the threat of loss of public range.

## Red Fishing Threat Seen

SEATTLE, April 3 (AP)—E. A. Ruthford, who represented the entire west coast fishing industry at state department hearings last January, said today Russian fishermen will be in a position "to ruin the American fishing industry" unless tariff protection is granted.

He made the comment in regard to Senator Magnuson's

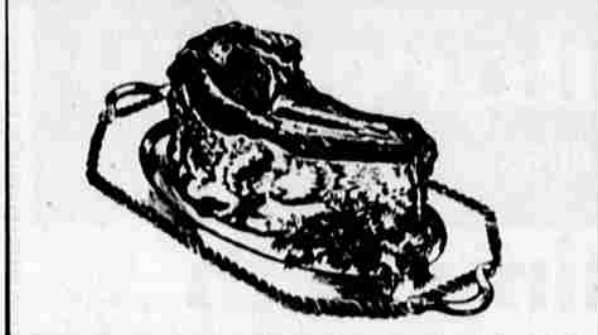
statement to Secretary of State Marshall yesterday that Russians using 16 former U. S. vessels have "invaded" the northern fishing waters.

A similar viewpoint on tariffs was expressed by Harold E. Lokken, manager of the Fishing Vessel Owners association. He, however, said he considers the Russian threat "potential rather than actual."

Harold Grotle, secretary of the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union, said fishermen are "100 per cent behind any move to stop Russia from moving in on the Bering sea fishing grounds."
