

Australian Couple Visits In Klamath

Mr. and Mrs. E. Gordon McDowell, in the United States on an educational tour sponsored by the Australian division of the Seventh Day Adventist church, left Wednesday after a brief visit in Klamath Falls and vicinity.

The Australian visitors were guests of Mr. and Mrs. Jess Brown of Henley while here and enjoyed trips to Crater Lake national park and the Lava Beds. They were heard over radio station KFLW Sunday morning on the Seventh Day Adventist church hour when Mrs. McDowell sang an English translation of a Maori song. This was the McDowells' first radio broadcast.

After visiting educational institutions throughout the United States, the McDowells will remain in New York for 12 months where they will attend Columbia university, completing work toward the degree of doctor of education. After finishing this study course they will tour England and Europe for three months, visiting colleges and halls of learning before returning to their home in Sydney, Australia.

The McDowells had already visited through Arizona and California before coming to Oregon. They left here for Winnipeg, Canada, stopping in Portland and Seattle en route. It was August, 1946, when the travelers left home. They reported a rough crossing from Australia to New Zealand and smooth sailing from there until they docked in San Francisco—a trip which took 19 days including stops in way ports.

A reception honoring their house guests was given by the Browns in their Henley home Saturday evening, which was attended by 21 guests.

An informal evening was spent with games and entertainment.
