King County Coroner John  
P. Brill Jr. tentatively set an  
inquest into the deaths for 9 a.  
m. Thursday. He said his office  
was also conducting an investi-  
gation at the scene and through  
conferences with the companies  
involved.

# Vandenberg Asks Greek OK

WASHINGTON, April 8 (AP)—  
Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.)  
called on the senate today to  
approve military and financial  
aid to Greece and Turkey in or-  
der to prevent "a chain of reac-  
tion which would threaten  
peace and security around the  
globe."

Far from "by-passing" the  
United Nations, Vandenberg de-  
clared in a senate speech, the  
proposed \$400,000,000 aid pro-  
gram is "the greatest act of vol-  
untary allegiance to us... an act  
of total faith."

Thus without mentioning  
Andre A. Gromyko by name,  
the foreign relations chairman  
replied to the Soviet representa-  
tive's assertion to the security  
council yesterday that the Uni-  
ted States had "disregarded"  
the UN's authority, "by-passing"  
the organization, and undermining  
its power.

"I know of no better way to  
destroy the United Nations' than  
to give it a specific job which it  
is neither intended nor prepared  
to do," Vandenberg said.

# Dr. Tillotson Dies At 81

Dr. Demetrius Tillotson, 81-  
year-old retired Methodist min-  
ister and father of Mitchell Til-  
lotson, manager of the Klamath  
Falls branch of the First National  
bank, died at 4 o'clock Monday  
afternoon at his home in Green-  
castle, Ind. Tillotson left here  
by plane late yesterday and was  
with members of his family in  
Greencastle this morning.

Dr. Tillotson had visited in the  
west on numerous occasions and  
was known to many in this sec-  
tion of southern Oregon. He was  
graduated with the class of 1889  
from Northwestern university  
and the major portion of his min-  
istry was spent in Indiana. He  
served as superintendent of a  
large Methodist hospital in that  
state and also the Presbyterian  
hospital in Denver, Colo., for a  
time. Dr. Tillotson was also dis-  
trict superintendent of the Meth-  
odist church in Indiana and a few  
years before his retirement  
served as field secretary on the  
board of DePauw university at  
Greencastle.

Death was attributed to ail-  
ments of his years. Dr. Tillotson  
was 81 years of age last March  
28, and became ill the day before  
his birthday. He leaves his wife,  
Anna, three sons and one daugh-  
ter.

# Police Probe Beer Theft

Five teen-age youths were as-  
sertedly involved in a beer  
drinking affair at the TeenAge  
club Saturday night and city po-  
lice and juvenile authorities  
thoroughly investigated the act  
in which two cases of beer were  
allegedly stolen from the Klamath  
Billiards earlier in the day.  
Two juveniles were absolved,  
two others were placed on in-  
formal probation and their par-  
ents ordered to pay for the beer,  
and the fifth is still being in-  
vestigated.

According to the juvenile of-  
fice, three of the boys took the  
beer from the Billiards, hid the  
two cases under the steps and  
about 7:30 that night agreed to  
meet and move the beer. Two  
of the three met at the appoint-  
ed time, the third failed to ap-  
pear. In the meantime another  
youth was asked to join the  
group and still another hailed in  
his car. The boys are then said  
to have moved the beer to the  
vicinity of the Teen-Age canteen  
at the armory, distributed it in  
several cars and the contents  
consumed by those involved as  
well as several others. Directors  
of the canteen called city police  
and the five ordered to appear  
at the police station from where  
they were turned over to juve-  
nile authorities. None of the  
beer was consumed in the can-  
teen.
